Walter and Curve Allen, Lewis Lumber and Alden Clary started for the big woods Sunday for a few days hunt.

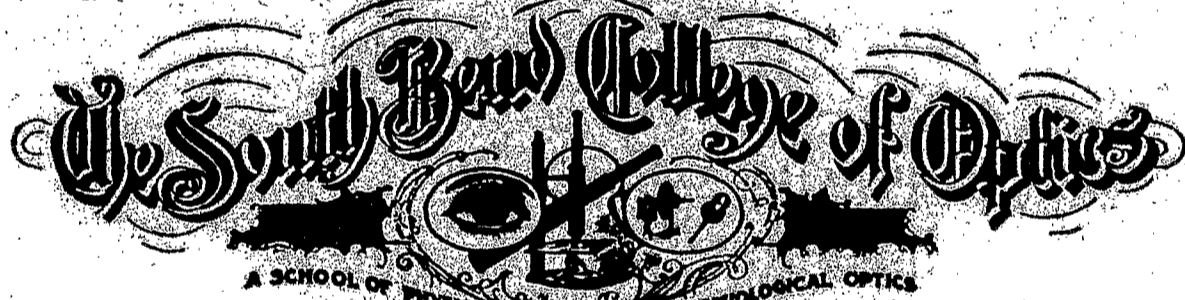
E. L. Wheeler will be at the Brushton House tomorrow. Call and have your eyes fitted with glasses.

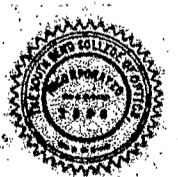
