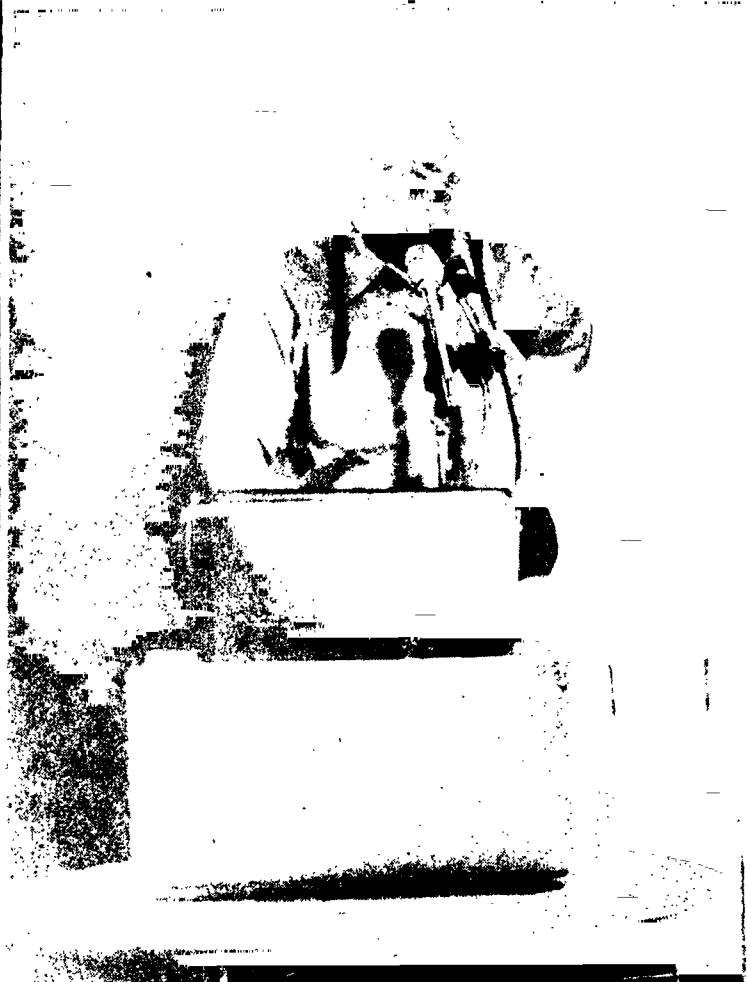

Native Americans from the Akwesasne/St. Regis Reservation community will be the primary speakers for the lecture series. Presentations will emphasize the culture of the Mohawk tribe of the Iroquois Confederacy, and will be of particular relevance for teachers of Native American curriculum materials or who teach Native American students.

Dr. Robert N. Wells, Professor of Government and Director of Native American Programs, St. Lawrence University, Canton, New York.

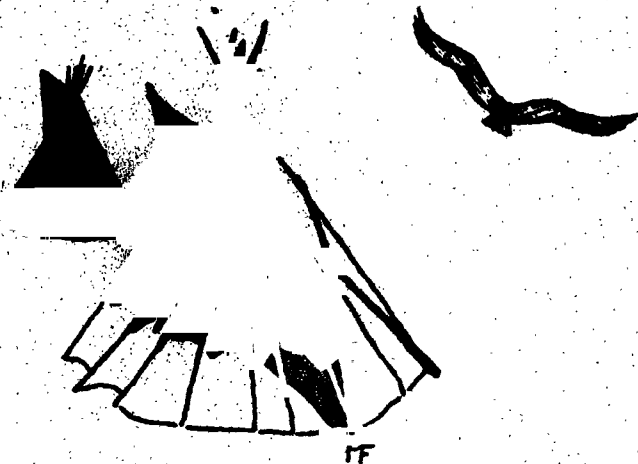

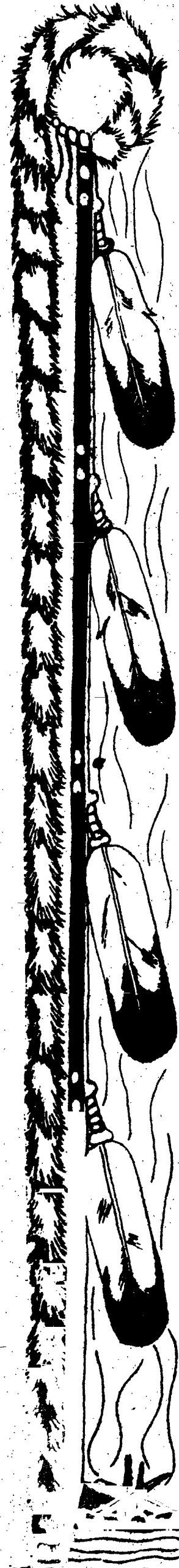
