FOURTH WORLD DATA BANK

The Department of Native Studies at the University of Sudbury is developing a Data Base focusing on the Fourth World Peoples. The project is financed by The Employment Development Branch and The Ontario Communications. It is co-ordinated by Info-North Ltd. and Laurentian University which have the facilities, such as, the Telidon Communication Computer System.

Telidon is a two way communication system that can be used by its user to obtain information and to introduce material that reflect certain subjects that they are acquiring for. The data is updated daily so that the user can have the most recent information. This Data Base will benefit everyone concerned in the future. It can also be used by Educational Systems from elementary schools to universities and Native Organizations. In the future, Telidon will service homes and both the public and private sectors.

At first, the project was just a summer work for Native students, but it is now on-going. Presently, we are on the process of net working to continue our goal of developing a Data Base on Fourth World Peoples.

Due to the limited of information that we have, we are requesting your assistance in providing us with any information that you have dealing with the Fourth World. Such as, names of resource centers, list of authors and publications, and also working groups that are establishing the Fourth World.
