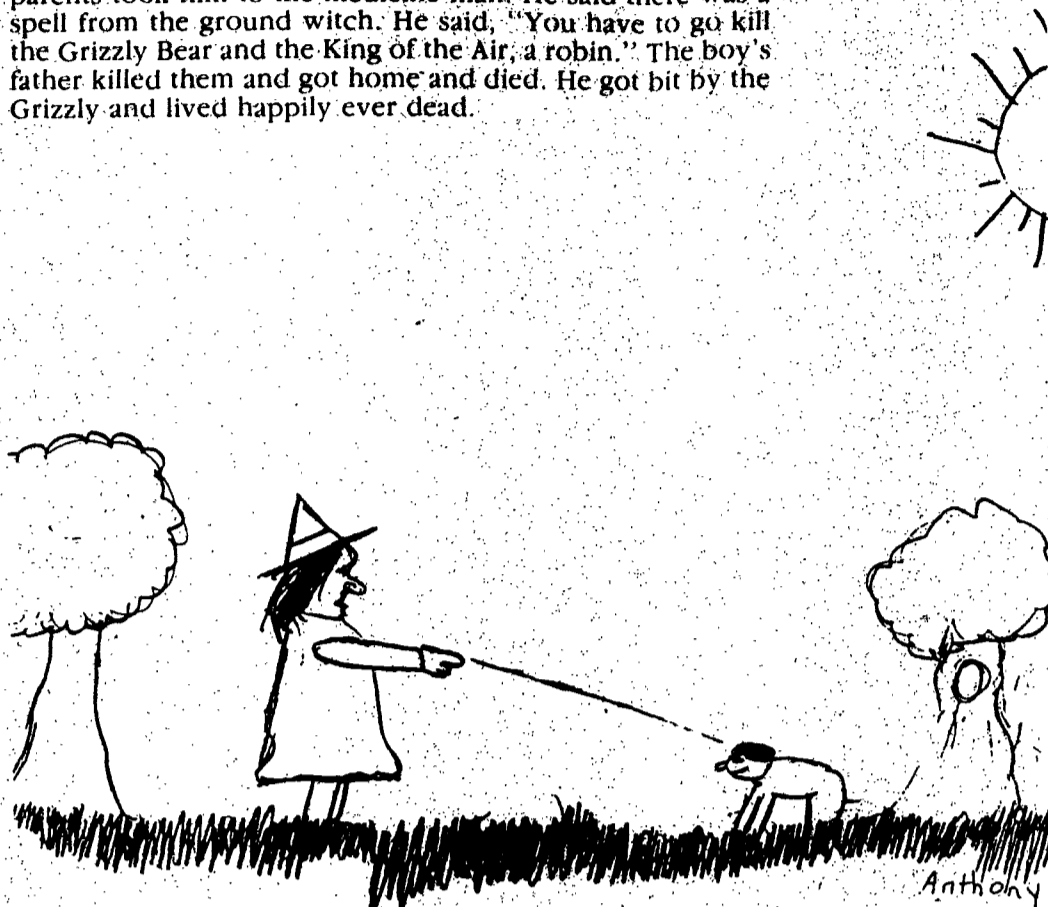

## The Indian Boy by Tina Gaspe

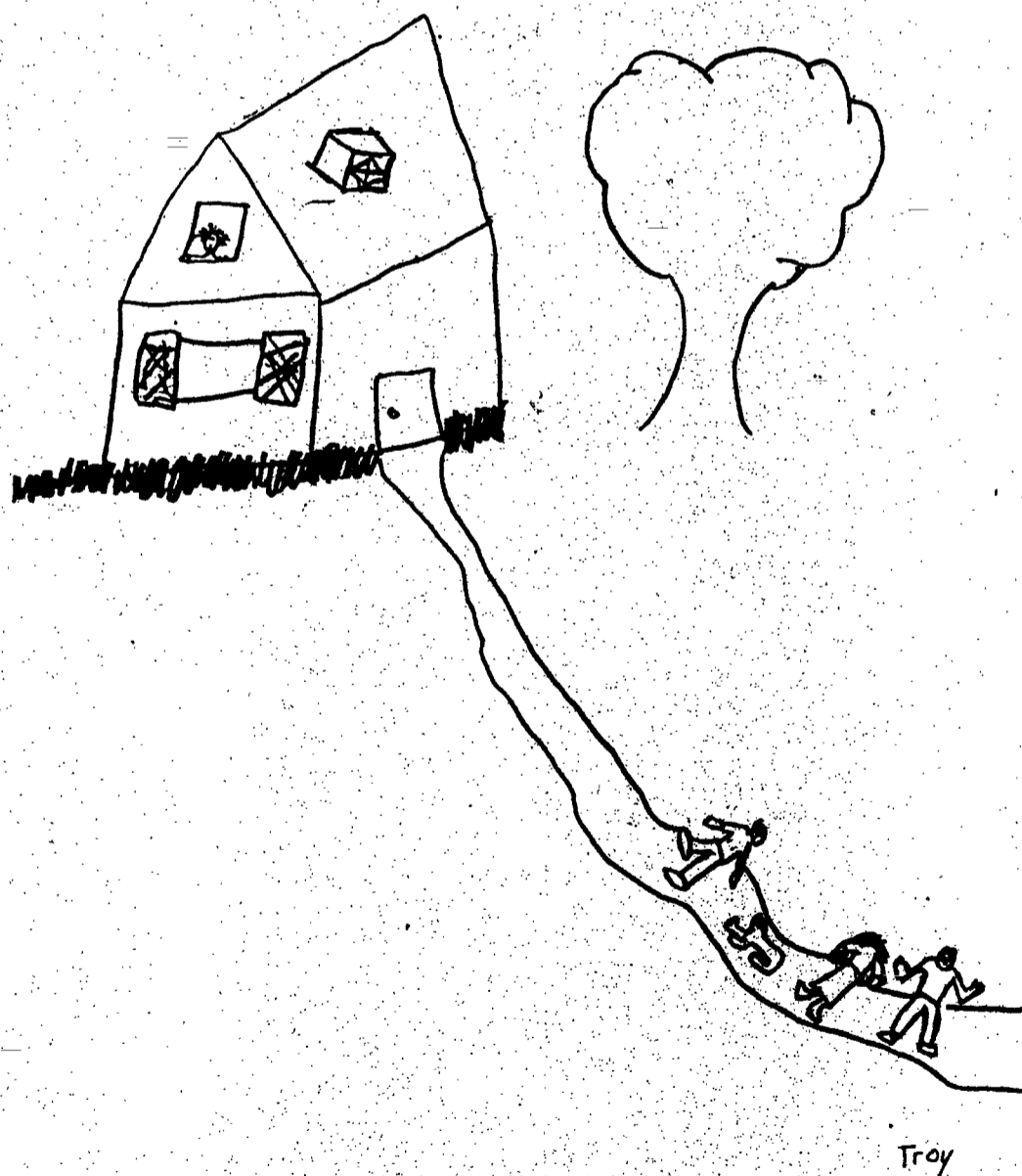
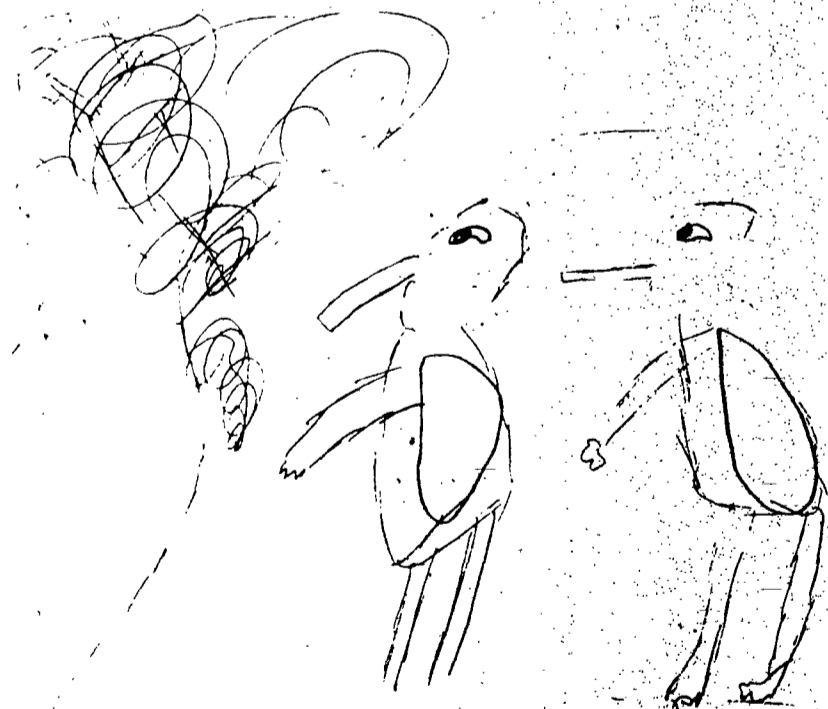

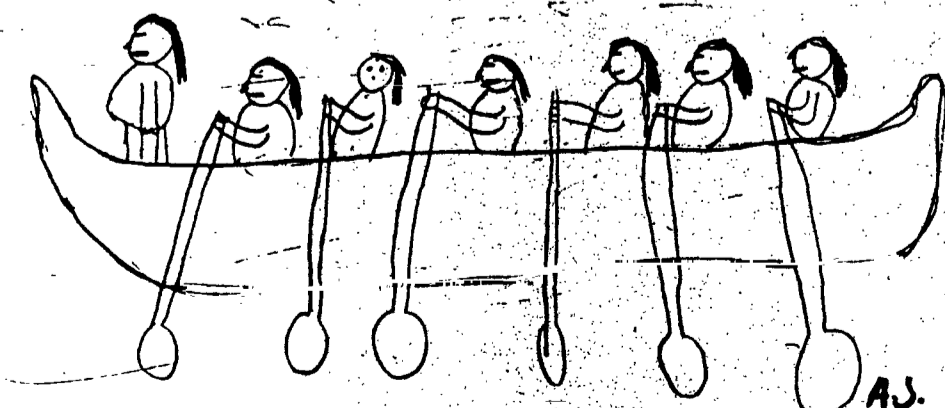
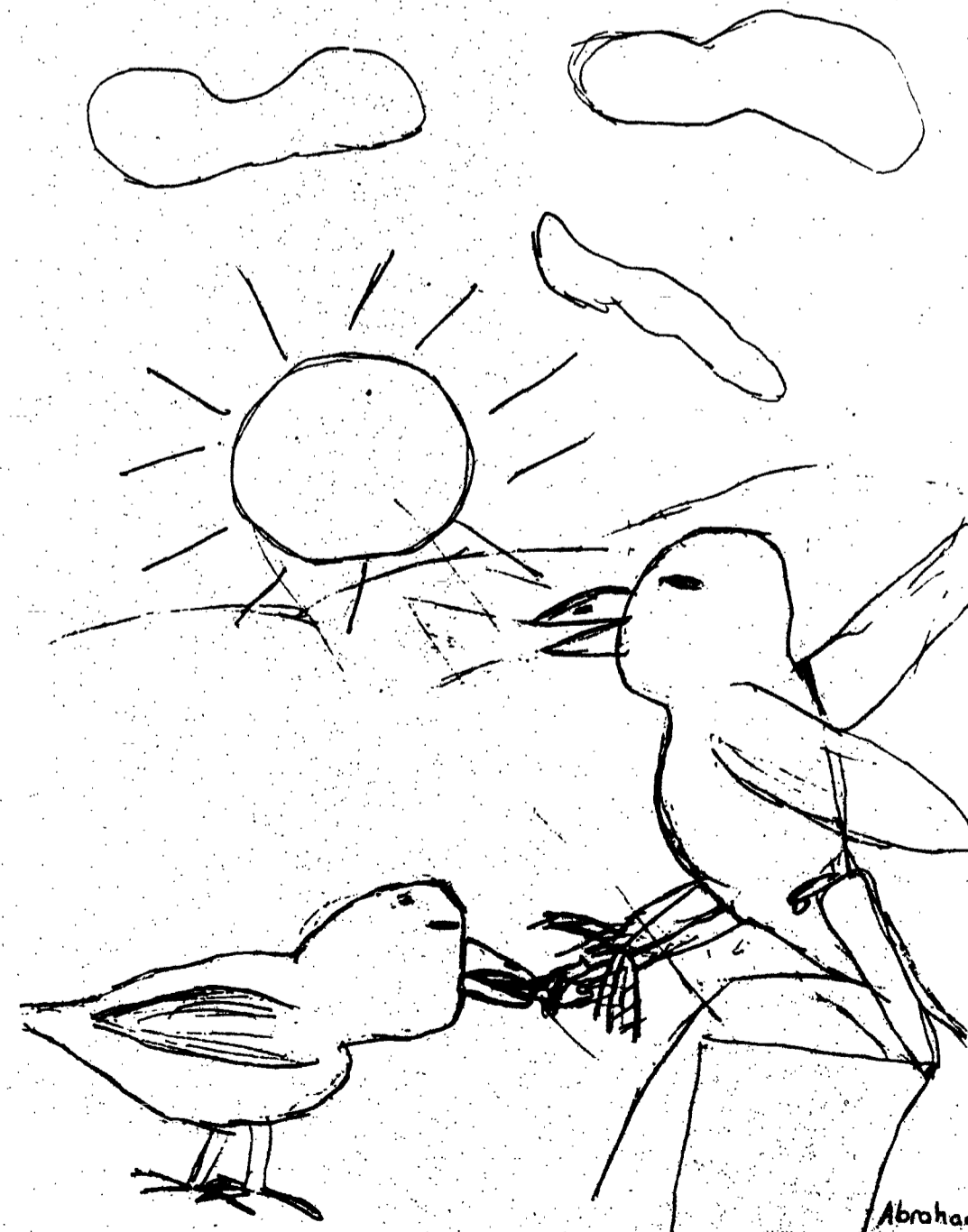
## The Two Giant Mosquitoes by A. J. Thompson
