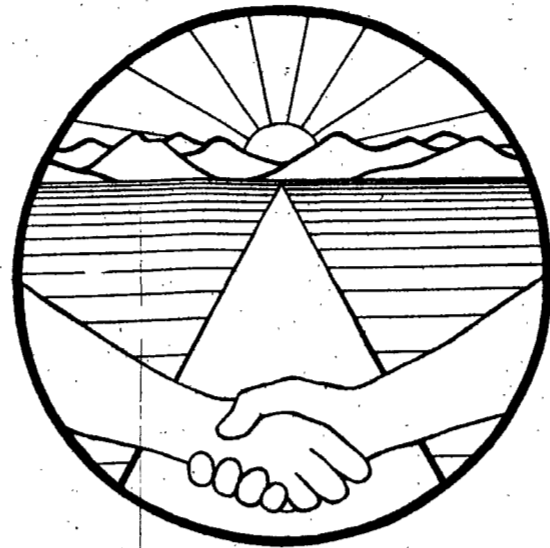

New York State is actively bidding for the project but has not made any contact with the native governments here to find out how the Collider would affect the land claims process. One plan is to have the Collider placed beneath the Satsertati (State) Road section of Akwesasne but the primary design would have the Collider located upon the Dundee, Quebec area. The three councils here are presently seeking the return of 20,000 acres of land that was illegally taken from Akwesasne.

The three councils here have been considering seeking to expand the present boundaries of Akwesasne to include the 22,000 acres of the Brasher State Forest, were part of the Collider would be situated.

The local state legislators are pushing hard to have the project here and have voted to spend \$1,000,000 to purchase lands for the Collider if it is built in this region. According to Thomas Tobin, director of the Adirondack North Country Association, the local non-Indian population wants the collider "more than anyone else." The area legislators favor an agreement with Canada so both nations would share the cost of the Collider.

The officials did not discuss what military uses the Collider would have, its environmental impact or its health hazards because of its use of nuclear energy. The officials did not discuss how the collider could be constructed on Mohawk land without the consent of the Indian population here.

NWT Population Growing Fast

The population of the Northwest Territories grew faster than anywhere else in Canada between 1981 and 1986.

It soared 14.2 percent, up 6,497 to 52,238, compared with a national average of just 4.2 percent, Statistics Canada says.

Alberta had the second fastest growth rate at 6.1 percent. Ontario was third at 5.7 percent.

In general, the population rise is due to an increasing birth rate, especially high in the Eastern Arctic, and "Not because of any great influx of people into the NWT," says chief territorial statistician Ralph Joyce.

"We get a lot of churning in the NWT — people coming and people going," Joyce says.

Many of the fastest growing communities are in the Baffin region. Arctic Bay's population rose 27.2 percent; Hall Beach 29.2 percent; Iqaluit 26.3 percent; Lake Harbour 29.4 percent and Nanisivik 20.7 percent.

Snare Lake showed the biggest population jump of all NWT communities. Its population rose 72.5 percent, to 119 from 69.

Lac La Martre rose 28.7 percent; Yellowknife 23.9 percent and Wrigley 17.5 percent.

In the Inuvik region, the population of Norman Wells jumped 49.3 percent; Fort Good Hope 21.4 percent; Fort McPherson 20.3 percent; Tuktoyaktuk 20.3 percent and Fort Norman 16.1 percent.

Population dropped in several communities: Bathurst Inlet by 20 percent; Arctic Red River 10 percent; Colville Lake 8.8 percent; Detah 8.4 percent; Fort Resolution 6.9 percent; Jean Marie River 7.2 percent; Kakisa 16.7 percent; Tungsten 25.6 percent and Trout Lake 8.5 percent.

Asked if the figures indicated a population shift to larger communities from the smaller ones, Joyce said, "I haven't looked at that but a couple of people have raised that question."

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Soboba Bingo Hall Ordered to Close Doors

Soboba Indian Reservation-Federal officials formally warned operators of Soboba Bingo yesterday to shut their doors or face prosecution.

The hall opened Friday under its fourth set of managers in seven months. But the contract between Native American Management Association and the Soboba Band of Mission Indians has not been approved by the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Officials say the operators violated a federal statute that prohibits outside organizations from contracting with a tribe without government approval. The operators could face civil or even criminal action, officials said.

Tribal and bingo hall officials offered conflicting assessments of the situation. Pete Dennis, president of the Native American Management Association, said he did not know that the bureau objected to the hall opening before contract approval. Bureau officials say they informally warned the operators earlier this month.

Scott Cozart, chairman of the tribal council, said reservation leaders agreed last week to substitute a team of Sobobas until the contract could be approved.

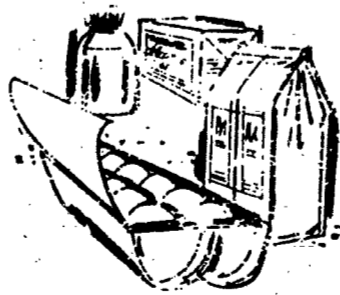

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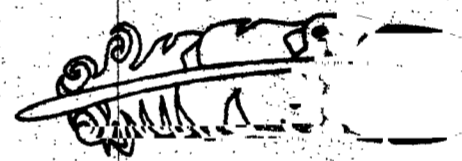

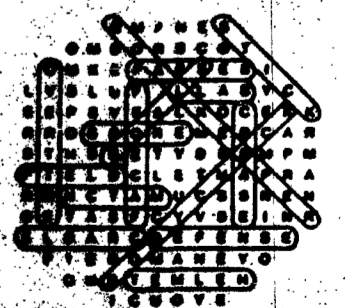
