Child Care in Your Home

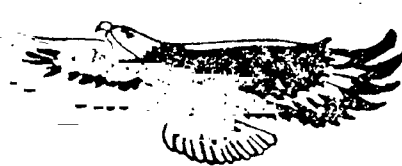

Iakhihsohtha News Month of June

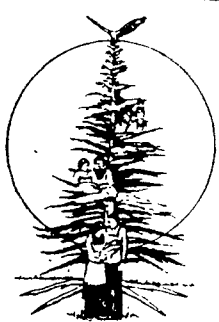

Participate in the raising of Woodland Indian sweatlodge with a Cree Indian elder Don Cardinal with stories and legends past down from his ancestors.

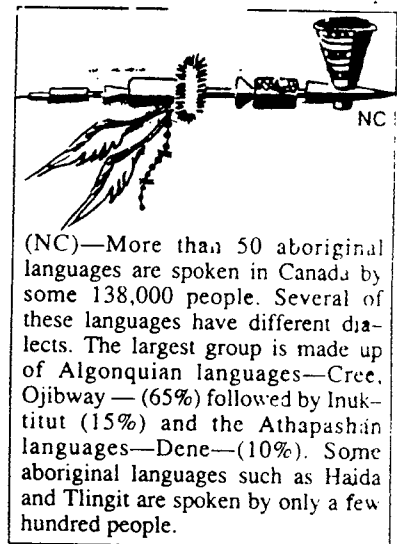
Native crafts and Colonial crafts will be available for purchase from the artists.

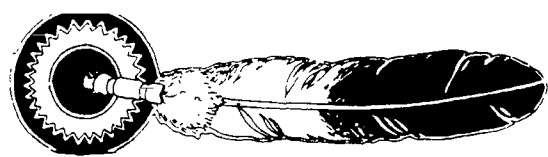
