Victoria Day tea

Since Victoria Day, May 24th has been a day of special celebration since 1845. It was established as a Canadian holiday to transform the Queen's Birthday into a grand occasion and to salute the British Empire. Today, it marks the first of four glorious summer long weekends. The May 24 weekend means opening the cottage, planting the garden and for brave souls, the first plunge into still ice lakes.

Make May 24th a regal affair this year by hosting a traditional afternoon tea. Serve flavoured teas like Earl Grey,

Scotch Scones

1 1/2 cups 350 ml quick rolled oats
1 1/2 cups 375 ml all purpose flour
1/4 cup 50 ml sugar
1 tsp 5 ml baking powder
1/2 tsp 2 ml salt
1/2 cup 125 ml margarine or butter, melted
1/3 cup 75 ml 2% or skim milk
1 egg

Combine rolled oats, flour, sugar, baking powder and salt in a large bowl. Beat together margarine, milk and egg. Stir liquid ingredients into flour just until combined. Do not overmix. Turn mixture onto a lightly floured surface and pat out or roll into a rectangle about 23 x 90 cm (9 x 12 in)

Cut into 9 rectangles then cut each again diagonally to form 18 triangles. Place on a lightly greased baking sheet. Bake in a 220°C (425°F) oven 12 to 14 minutes until golden brown. Serve warm. Makes 18 scones.

Each serving: 1 Scone; 1 Starchy Choice; 1 Fat & Oil's Choice; 16 g carbohydrate; 3 g protein; 6 g fat; 550 kilojoules (130 Calories)

Requirements for Scholarship Assistance

1. Only community members of Akwesasne are eligible, with one exception; any person who served with the Akwesasne Emergency Team as a member in good standing, while it was an ambulance service, is eligible despite residency or nationality.
2. The applicant must have completed high school or hold a General Equivalency Diploma.
3. Any field of study is acceptable provided it be through an accredited school.
4. The successful recipient must demonstrate responsibility to the community.
5. The successful recipient must exhibit financial need i.e., cannot get funded through other sources, funded amount may be insufficient to meet basic needs, etc.
6. Each applicant must submit a personal letter expressing, at the least, need and planned use of scholarship funds.

Applications for the 1992-1993 school year will be accepted no later than June 5, 1992.

7. With the exception of AET members, the successful recipient will be Native American.

8. Preference will be given to applicants who can prove voluntary service to the organizations of Akwesasne.

A minimum of one and a maximum of three scholarships will be awarded annually on May 30 of every year. The scholarship amount will be three hundred dollars (\$300). The number awarded will reflect the financial ability of the Akwesasne Emergency Team to provide the scholarship.

The social, emotional, physical and intellectual growth of a child is examined through academic studies as well as practical experience.

Guidelines for Assessing Proposals for Hydro Quebec Grant

1. A. Submissions will be entertained from Organizations that have been in existence for at least one (1) year, on the recommendation of the St. Regis Village Elders club, as an Organization whose objective benefits the Akwesasne Community and its members.

B. Organizations should submit a statement of their overall goals and objective and their organizational profile.

2. Donations to Organizations who service the Akwesasne Community in general, should be shared with the Chenail Homemakers where possible.

3. The activities of the Proposals submitted, would not otherwise be available without the assistance of this grant. Funds may not be used for on-going operating costs.

4. The activities of the Proposals submitted must be ones that are beneficial to the Akwesasne Community or its members. However, grant money will not be given for the purpose of financial enhancement of an individual Community member.

5. An expenditure report from the receiving Organization must be submitted at a regular meeting of the St. Regis Village Elders Club. The expenditure report must be submitted as soon as money is used, and not later than six (6) months after receipt of first grant allocations. Further, that future submissions from all organizations should be based on proper reporting of passed grant expenditures.

6. Grant Proposals will be determined in the following

Anticipatory Professional Training Announcement Professional Cooking Course (Full-time)

Location: Akwesasne
Anticipated Start Date: September 1992

Duration: Approximately 32 weeks
Admission Requirements: Completed grade 10, including English and Math; out of school for twelve (12) months; dedication and motivation to successfully complete the course.

The Professional Cooking Course is specifically designed to prepare the graduating student for work in a professional institution, restaurant and other food service organizations.

The course will provide the student with an opportunity to develop the knowledge and skills necessary for working in the Professional Cooking field.

In order to be considered for this course, an application and high school transcripts must be submitted to the Adult Education office located in St. Regis at Administration Building IV. All applicants meeting the admission requirements will be interviewed before the final selection of students is made.

To help ensure the successful completion of the course, the class size will be limited to 10 students.

7. Grant allocations will be given in two (2) equal installments as follows:

A. When funds are received from Hydro Quebec.

B. The second installment upon receipt of expenditure report. Should the report not be received within six (6) months, the second installment will be forfeited.

8. Determination on amounts allocated are as follows:

A. An amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) will be set aside for the Donation Contingency Fund.

B. An initial amount not exceeding one thousand and five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) will be given. However, for submissions above this amount, the decisions will be made based on above criteria and need.

C. An administration fee of 10% of the total grant (\$2,500.00) will be retained by the St. Regis Village Elders for administration of this grant.

9. Decisions will not be based on Religious or Political affiliations.
