## Iroquois Lacrosse Association News

The Iroquois Lacrosse Senior "B" mens league had a meeting on April 1, 1995, in Oneida Nation Territory. The meeting started with a review of the March minutes by Chairperson, Richard Jock. The minutes were approved with minor changes and the meeting went on to new business. The first item under new business was the acceptance of Oneida into the Senior "B" League. Oneida was accepted and the team had five working days to submit their fees for 1995.

The next item on the

agenda was jurisdiction and the review of three proposals submitted to amend the league by-laws concerning jurisdiction. The three proposals ranged from free agency, freedom of choice by players to protection lists. The discussion was lengthy and the team owners came to a consensus on the issue of free agency. It was generally agreed that total free agency is not a good way to go and could be bad for the league.

The Iroquois Lacrosse Association proposal seemed to be the most

favorable for the senior league owners and coaches. The proposal included a protected list of players. The discussion surrounding this proposal concerned the number for the protected list and the number for the overage junior players to be protected. The consensus was: each team protects 17 players (15 runners and two goalies) and 5 overage juniors. The teams all agreed and it was understood that the teams would protect players (17). The two new teams (Long Sault Outlaws and Oneida)

were not required to submit a protected list. The agreement also included: the second year (96) the number to be protected to 20 (18 runners, 2 goalies) plus 5 overage players and the third was (97) the number would increase to 25.

The meeting went on to discuss scheduling and times requested by the various teams. There was mention of the possibility of increasing administration fees to meet rising costs. The other item was the referee-in-chief and scheduling of referees for the games for the

moment. Until a referee-in-chief is selected the scheduling will go through the league office. There is concern about eligible referees for the Master's Cup this September. There needs to be clinics to card our referees. The meeting closed with a summarization of the day's agenda: There was give and take by all involved and that's how it should be to promote lacrosse for the communities and not for individuals. Team owners made the decision on the protected list to help each team and not to hurt lacrosse but rather promote.

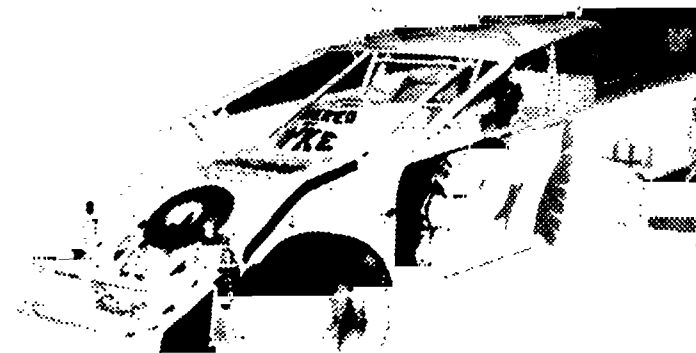
