Peace Internships

The Fellowships Of Reconciliation (FOR), a national interfaith peace and justice organization, is accepting applications for 1996-97 internships. FOR interns work with FOR staff to build racial and economic justice, peace, and a stronger movement of faith-based nonviolent activists.

Openings for 1996-97:

*** Racial and Economic Justice:** Assist in outreach to other organizations, work with program coordinator and Racial and Economic Justice Task Force to develop "Women of Color in the Workplace" and other projects and campaigns related to racial and economic justice issues. Responsible for correspondence, helping to develop written resources.

*** Communications/Program:** Work with the staff of Fellowship, the oldest continuously published peace journal in the U.S., gaining hands-on experience in putting out a magazine. Responsibilities include keyboarding, proofreading, research, correspondence, and other assignments. Secondary assignment involves working closely with program staff to develop racial dialogue projects and nonviolence training programs for youth.

*** Local Group Organizing:** Work with FOR's network of 80 local group and 15 affiliated religious peace fellowships. Help in the formation of new groups, prepare informational mailings and resources, organize gatherings, arrange for speakers, carry out other projects to strengthen local FOR organizing. Also administer peace prize program, which recognizes nonviolent social change activists, nationally and internationally.

QUALIFICATIONS: Commitment to a nonviolent approach in building a just and peaceful world. Ability to work well with people from a variety of faith, racial and cultural back-

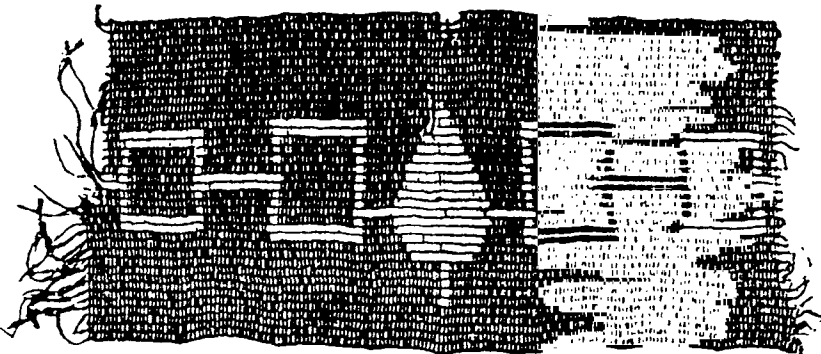
grounds. Organizing and/or communications skills related to the intern's specific program area. Computer familiarity desirable. Interns must be at least 21 years of age and willing to make a one-year commitment to the position.

HOUSING AND BENEFITS: Interns receive room, medical insurance and a \$600/month stipend. Four weeks vacation and paid holidays are also included. Housing includes a private room and shared bath, with use of a kitchen and lounge. Internships are based at the FOR's national headquarters in Nyack, New York, 45 minutes north of New York City. Public transportation to New York City is near by.

Internships begin in early September 1996. The FOR is an affirmative action employer, and actively seeks applications from people of color, women, lesbians and gay men.

Native American Nursing Conference to be held at University of Wisconsin, Eau Claire

EAU CLAIRE — The University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire will host the Sixth Annual Indian Nursing Education Conference.

"Nursing 2000: Future Directions" will be held April 18-20 in Davies Center. The event will offer a series of workshops led by speakers from throughout the nation. Informational booths will include materials on education, professional organizations and career opportunities. This is the first time UW-Eau Claire will host the conference.

The purpose of the conference is to showcase the work of American Indians in the nursing profession and to demonstrate the opportunities awaiting them in the nursing field, said Scott Beard, the recruiter/coordinator for the ASCEND American Indian Nursing program at UW-Eau Claire.

The conference will touch on a range of issues, from becoming a better nurse by using the World Wide Web to integrating traditional Indian medicine into curriculum, Beard said.

Although the conference is geared toward those involved in nursing, Beard encourages the public to attend. The UW-Eau Claire Native American Student Association is sponsoring cultural events during the conference,

including a powwow in Zorn Arena.

"It's not only about health care," Beard said. "It gives people who have no experience with Native American people information that they would find interesting. We cut across a wide array of areas and interests."

Tickets can be purchased at the door or by calling (715) 836-5279. The fee includes free admission to the day's cultural events, meals and workshop materials.

The prices for attending one day are: student, \$10; affiliated faculty, \$20; and unaffiliated faculty and others, \$25. The two-day prices are student, \$15; affiliated faculty, \$35; and unaffiliated faculty and others, \$45.
