Paraphrased Photographs of the World's Doings

It was announced on Thursday that President Roosevelt would begin his southern trip on Oct. 17. It is his intention to visit many of the important cities of the south, including Richmond, Va.; Raleigh and Charlotte, N. C.; Atlanta, Ga.; Jacksonville and Tampa, Fla.; Birmingham, Montgomery and Mobile, Ala.; New Orleans and Little Rock, Ark. The trip will end at Little Rock and the president and party will return directly to Washington from that city.

James Hope, known on the criminal records as Jimmy Hope and Old Man Hope, the notorious Manhattan bank burglar, died at his home in New York on Friday. For two years he had been in ill health and unable to do any work. The Manhattan bank burglary, which Hope engineered, was perhaps the greatest bank robbery that ever occurred. The fleeing gang took away with it \$2,000,000 in stocks, bonds and money. Little of this has ever been recovered.

Although the investigation will not be closed until the testimony of W. W. Russell, American minister to Cuba, has been heard, Secretary Taft has already reviewed and summarized the facts in the charges against Frank J. Hayes, assistant secretary of state, who was sent to H. H. Brown, American minister to Venezuela, and has concluded that Mr. Brown has not succeeded in proving anything against Mr. Hayes' integrity.

On Wednesday Judge Kuhlman of the United States circuit court decided that the federal courts have jurisdiction over the bills for injunction brought by the express companies against the striking teamsters. The attorneys for the teamsters denied that the federal court has jurisdiction over such bills, but will not be permitted to do so.

In view of the unqualified decision of the chairman, panel commission to enforce the eight hour law on the canal work on Tuesday, Secretary Taft on Tuesday stated the grounds upon which Attorney General Clegg had reached his decision on that important matter.
