The liabilities are \$3800 and assets \$500. Earl Bancroft appeared for the bankrupt and J. J. McNell for creditors. The first meeting of the creditors in the matter of William H. Fallon of Newwood, holder, will be held on the 15th. The liabilities are \$5823.46 and the assets \$2848. T. J. Turner represents the bankrupt.

Driscoll, Nicholas Lettner and Geo. W. Adams. Mr. A. L. Lockwood, who had supervision of the construction of the plant, retains his interests under the reorganization, and will remain as manager of the plant. The mill as now equipped is turning out nearly eleven tons of raw stock a day, and improvements contemplated will largely increase the capacity. The entire output will be used by the Syracuse Co. and will be printed into wall paper at its Syracuse plant.

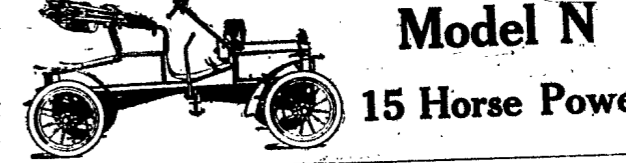
