Special preparations are also under way for the memorial to Mr. Malby, and the details are in the hands of Congressman Edwin Merritt Jr., his successor. Mr. Malby was for many years one of the best of the House and his sudden death in New York ten days after his return from the Republican national convention in Chicago was a great shock to his Congressional associates. It is understood that one of the principal tributes to his memory will be paid by "Uncle Joe" Cannon with whom he was a great favorite. The other speakers will include the veteran Representative Sergio Payne, Congressman Ned Taylor of Ohio, an old-time friend, and Congressman Merritt.

—Charles A. Clark, a well known business man of Halesboro, died Jan. 14, 1913, after a long illness. His death had been expected daily for the last two months. Charles A. Clark was born in Potsdam, Nov. 12, 1836, and was a son of Theodore and Clara Hill Clark. He located in Halesboro in 1860 to Eliza Jane Harbut, and they were among the pioneers of this north country in that line of industry. Their mill was located a mile up the Oswegatchie from Halesboro where the plant of the Oswegatchie Light & Power Co. is now located. Mr. Clark was married in 1870 to Eliza Jane Harbut, and shortly afterward he engaged in the dry goods business in Gouverneur in partnership with Nelson A. Howard. He later returned to Halesboro, becoming one of the prominent business men of that village. His first wife died in the early '70s and in 1874 he married Mrs. Arline H. Phillips of Gouverneur. His whole business career was a most honorable one and he accumulated a fine property and he was one of the most prominent and influential citizens of his town. He was kindly and courteous and beneath a brusque exterior was a most generous and humane heart. He took deep interest in public affairs, but could never be induced to accept office with the exception of serving nine years as a town assessor. His politics was always an ardent Republican. Besides his widow he is survived by two sons, William T. Clark of Halesboro, superintendent of schools in the first supervisory district of the county, and Chas. H. Clark, city editor of the Ogdensburg News, one brother, Lyman H. Clark, of Massena, and one sister, Mrs. Harriet Taylor of Chicago.

—Very Rev. Dean O'Driscoll, for the last 42 years priest of St. Mary's parish in Canton, died suddenly at his home there Friday evening. He had been ill with the grip for several days, but was up and about the house the day before his death. Father Hugh O'Reilly, who occupies an adjoining room heard a noise in the room of his superior and as he went into the room he found the aged priest in a dying condition. Rev. Father O'Reilly had only time to administer the last rites of the church before the end came. Rev. Father O'Driscoll was born in the County Cork, Ireland, March 27, 1842. He was educated for the priesthood in Maynooth college in Ireland and was ordained 35 years ago. Immediately after his ordination he came to America and was priest at Copenhagen for a short time. He went to Canton 42 years ago and had remained there continuously ever since. Shortly after his being stationed there the Catholic church was burned and Dean O'Driscoll was assisting in his effort to rebuild the structure. As a result of his labors, a magnificent structure costing \$60,000 was erected, and some time later a handsome parsonage was erected, which Dean O'Driscoll occupied at the time of his death. Dean O'Driscoll was a man of most congenial temperament and was highly respected. His friends were numbered among the members of his own parish, and Protestants and he will be greatly missed in the life of that village. For many years he had alone conducted the affairs of his parish and even when given an assistant, he had few idle moments, devoting the major portion of his time to his church duties. Dean O'Driscoll was also prominent in the business life of the village. At the time of the organization of the First National Bank he became one of its stockholders and in 1893 was elected a director, which office he occupied at the time of his death. For many years he was a director of the St. Lawrence County Agricultural Society. Dean O'Driscoll is survived by one sister, who was his housekeeper, two nieces, Miss Anna Joy of New York and Mrs. Samuel Clark of Great Neck, L. I., and one nephew, Rev. Father James Joy of Copenhagen. The funeral was held from St. Mary's church Tuesday at 10 a. m. and eulogy from all over the Ogdensburg diocese were present.
