COULDN'T SWAT A FLY.

The passage of the Boylan bill to prohibit experiments on animals in the public schools would mean an end to the "swat the fly" campaigns waged in New York classrooms, Paul B. Mann, professor of biology of a New York high school, told a joint legislative committee last week.

Prof. Mann was one of the opponents of the three anti-vivisection bills on which a hearing was held.

"This measure would emasculate the courses of biology and physiology in every public school in the State," he said. "It would be unlawful to have a live frog jump about a table so that students could study the act of jumping. It would prohibit killing mosquitoes."

Prof. Mann is a Potsdam boy, son of the late Warren Mann.

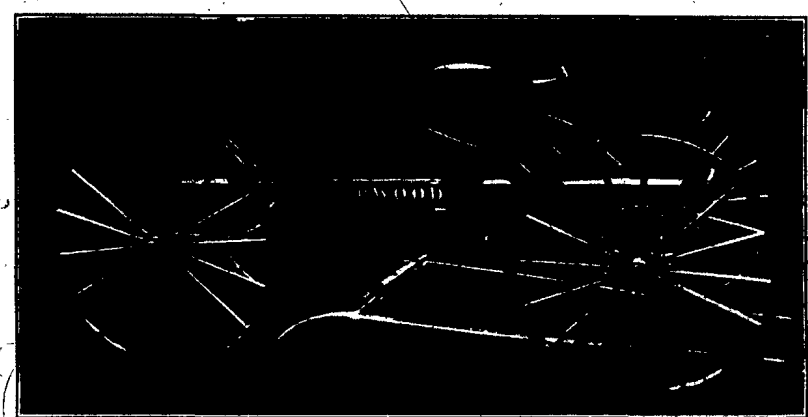
