THE CRUSADERS.

Please Large Audience at Opera House Thursday Evening.

On Thursday evening, June 6th, occurred one of the finest musical events of the season. "The Crusaders," by Nels W. Gade, was given by the Normal High School Chorus and the Normal Orchestra. The soloists were Miss Clara Beaudry, contralto; Mr. Charles Hart, tenor, and Mr. Arthur W. Hawkins, baritone.

Miss Beaudry, a former Crane student, delighted her audience with her rich contralto quality, both in the selections preceding the cantata and as Armida in "The Crusaders." Mr. Hart will long be remembered for his clear interpretation and rich tenor voice. His songs and his encores were received with the same enthusiastic response. None the less pleasing was his work as Rinaldo, in which he portrayed the bravest of the Crusaders. Mr. Hawkins opened the program with Beethoven's "Adelaide," and he was received with his usual hearty welcome, and as Peter, the Hermit, in "The Crusaders" his voice was particularly effective. Miss Helen Hosmer acted as accompanist for both the recital and the cantata. Her playing was excellent, showing sympathy and appreciation. Much of the success of the entire production was due to Mr. M. M. Tanniciffe, whose work with both orchestra and chorus was manifested in the excellent results.

Inasmuch as the annual festival has been omitted for the past two years, the members of this chorus were inexperienced, yet the interpretation and tone quality was good.

Credit is due the Art Department of the Normal, which under the direction of Miss Folger and Miss Sanford, prepared the decorations consisting of a frieze illustrating the Crusaders on the march.

The concert was a financial success. The gross receipts were \$271 which will pay all expenses. The business management of this concert was entirely in charge of Miss Hosmer.
