

THOMAS KENNEY DIES SUDDENLY

FORMER POTSDAM MAN DROPS DEAD IN WATERTOWN STREET.

Thomas Kenney, for many years a resident of Potsdam, dropped dead about 10 o'clock last Wednesday morning on Court street, Watertown from heart trouble. Mr. Kenney was walking up Court street and when he arrived in front of the Bennett store he fell to the walk. He tried to rise but was unable to. Chas. Deary, a local barber in a nearby shop ran to his assistance and

another man carried Mr. Kenney to the City Hall where Dr. W. Brewer was called. Dr. Brewer and Chief Singleton by artificial respiration succeeded in bringing pulse action twice to the man. He died about 15 minutes after he dropped. District Attorney Cooper was notified and arrived in a few minutes. Thomas Kenney, a son, who conducts a cab in Public Square, was also notified. Mr. Kenney was born in Richmond Ont., Canada, and moved to Potsdam some years ago, coming to Watertown about six years ago. He was a member of the Loyal Order of Moose and was employed as steward by the organization. He is survived by his wife Mrs. Agnes Kenney, one son, Thomas H. Kenney, a brother James of Watertown, and by two sisters, Mrs. Louis Murray and Miss Mattie Kenney of Potsdam. The body was brought here Friday for interment.

PHONE EMPLOYEES PENSIONS.
Mountain Home Directors Provide For Disability Allowance.

At a meeting of the Mountain Home Telephone Company, held in Plattsburg, the directors approved of a resolution planned for employees' pensions, disability benefits and death benefits, to take effect after January 1, 1920.

An employee who has been totally disabled from accident will receive full pay for thirteen weeks, and half pay for the balance of the time.

An employee who has been partially disabled from accident will receive full pay for thirteen weeks and half pay for the remainder of the period, but not in excess of six years.

An employee who has been with the company two years or more, and who, by reason of sickness is absent will receive from seven months to seven months' full pay, depending on the length of service with the company.

The dependents of a deceased employee will receive six months' pay, if the term of employment has been five years or more, and one year's pay if the term of employment has been ten or more years. In either case the maximum is \$2,000.

In case of death by accident the dependent relatives will receive 3 years' pay, not to exceed \$1500.

TOO FEW APPLICANTS.
The Civil Service Commission invites special attention to the fact that in examinations held recently in Ogdensburg and other cities throughout the country, for apprentice fish culturists, Bureau of Fisheries, for local and assistant inspectors of boilers and hulls, Steamboat Inspection Service, and for physical laboratory helpers, proof readers graphotype operators, addressograph operators and mimeograph operators, Department of Service, Washington, D. C., applicants were not secured in the number desired, and that the examinations will again be held Jan. 7, 1920.

Persons interested in these or other examinations should apply to the Secretary of the U. S. Civil Service Board at the local post office for detailed information and application blanks.

FIREMEN BATTLE IN COLD.
Blaze Guts House of Geo. Clements In Elderkin St. Sunday Morning.

The house of George Clements in Elderkin street was gutted by a fire starting from an over heated stove-pipe about 10 Sunday morning. Delay was experienced in sending by the alarm and the fire had a good start, requiring an hour and a half's work on the part of the firemen before it was extinguished. Two lines of hose were used and the intense cold of the low zero made the work of the department doubly difficult.
