

TIMBER DEAL IN FRANKLIN COUNTY

MALONE PAPER CO. TO GET REYNOLDS PULP WOOD.

Three of the biggest business transactions of the year in this vicinity were consummated in Malone recently. Herbert H. and Berton L. Reynolds have purchased the interests of their brother, J. Newton Reynolds,

and the heirs of their brother, the late Frank B. Reynolds, in all the property of Reynolds Bros. and Co. The property includes between 8000 and 10,000 acres of land in the town of Brandon, the saw mill and store, personal property, houses, etc., at Reynolds. The Messrs. Reynolds have closed a contract with the Malone Paper Co. to deliver to them all the pulpwood on the tract. This covers all spruce and balsam timber above seven inches on the stump and is to be cut and delivered at the company's mill or f. o. b. cars in Malone within three years. The cut of pulpwood is estimated at 15,000 cords or upwards.

The third transaction consummated by the Messrs. Reynolds is the sale of all sawed lumber on hand at Reynolds, and lumber to be sawed from logs now in the pond, to the Malone Lumber Co., in which B. L. Reynolds is a partner. This lumber is estimated at about one million feet.

BESSIE ABBOTT ESTATE \$122,000

Death of Noted Singer, Heuvelton Native, Occurred in New York.

Mrs. Bessie Abbott Story, opera singer, who died in her home in New York on February 9 last, left a gross estate of \$122,891, according to the transfer tax appraiser's report filed in the Surrogate's Court. With the exception of jewels worth about \$25,000, practically all of the famous soprano's estate consisted of her summer home at Westbury, L. I., and the furnishings there and in New York. Her cash account aggregated only \$784.

Mrs. Story was a native of Heuvelton, N. Y. Her mother, Mrs. Frances J. Pickens, widow of John Pickens, a merchant of New York, who was descended from Gen. Andrew Pickens, of South Carolina, gets a life income from the real estate and one-half of the personal property. Mrs. Jessie P. Lyle of New York, sister of the singer, inherits the residue.

LITTLE BOY IS DROWNED.

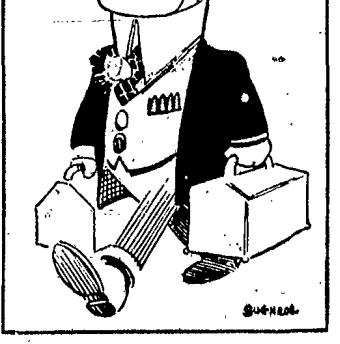
Massena Lad Breaks Through Ice and Falls into Grasse River.

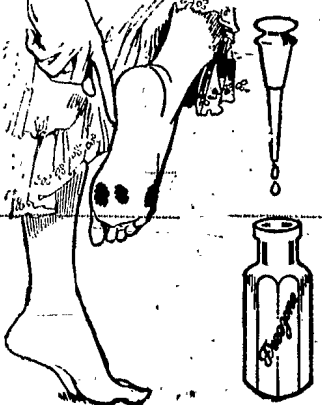
Character: Formed by Thought.




