DR. ALLEN TO WED.

Dr. and Mrs. C. H. Tripp of Clinton Corners, N. Y., announce the engagement of their daughter, Mabel Antoinette, to Dr. H. Allen of Salt Point, N. Y. Dr. Allen, who was formerly of Potsdam, is now living with his parents at Salt Point.

At the outbreak of the war Dr. Allen enlisted as a Second Lieutenant in the Veterinary Reserve Corps and in July, 1917, was ordered to France, where he was assigned to duty as Veterinarian with the First Infantry Brigade, 1st Div. A. E. F. With this organization he remained throughout the war. He saw service on several fronts in France, and was in the Army of Occupation. In due time he was promoted to the rank of Captain and given command of the Brigade Veterinary Unit.

Dr. Allen returned to the United States in August, 1919, and shortly after his return he visited friends in Potsdam, and at that time stated his great desire to return at once to Potsdam and resume his practice, but on account of illness in the family he deemed it his duty to remain at home until the spring of 1920. Dr. Allen will return to Potsdam late in February and resume his practice.

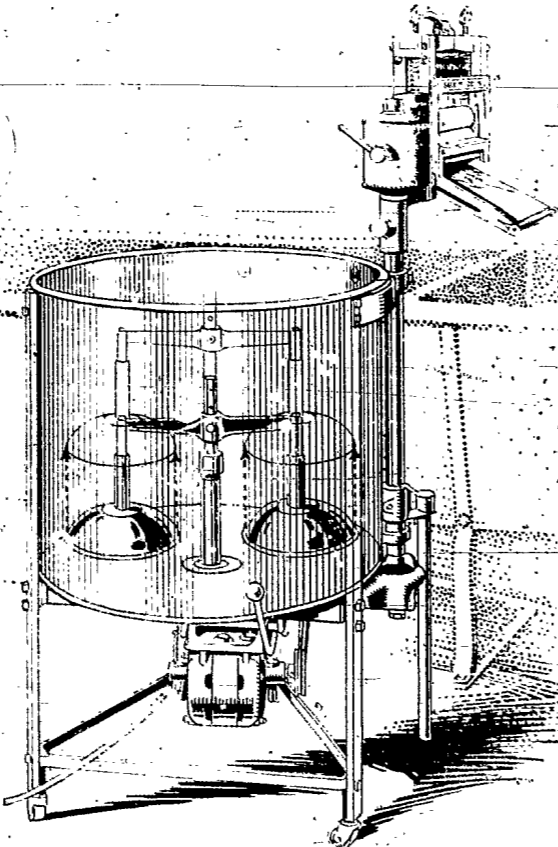
