**OUTTERSON BUYS NEW YORK MILL**

HAS A CAPACITY OF FIFTY TONS OF PAPER DAILY.

Mr. James A. Outterson of Cuthage, formerly of Potsdam, and well known throughout the paper mill business, has just purchased and taken over the management of the Raven Wood Paper Mill Company, located at the east end of Queensboro bridge on Long Island. The deal was completed Friday.

This mill occupies an entire city block and has a capacity of 50 tons daily of chip and news board. The mill is also equipped to make container and specialty paper. There are only two other paper mills in New York City. The products of this mill are delivered directly to New York by motor trucks and the trucks collect paper and folded news on their return trip. The paper is now selling from \$50 to \$80 a ton.

The officers of the new company are as follows: President and treasurer, J. A. Outterson; vice president, Joseph Bing; secretary, W. R. Van Allen.

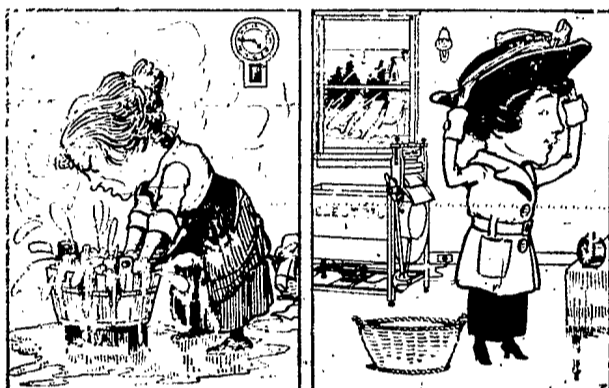
