FAVORS SMALL INCREASE.

Snell Gives Views On Congressional Reapportionment.

Congressman Bertrand H. Snell of Potsdam, who has been in Albany looking after committee assignments for northern New York assemblymen, is authority for the statement that he depends upon congress whether or not anything is to be done by the present legislature along congressional apportionment lines.

Congressman Snell explained that there is a strong disposition in congress to hold the members of the house as close as possible to its present status because of its unwieldy proportions. Some of the states, he admitted, are strong for an enlargement of the house, especially the western block.

Congressman Snell favors the smaller ratio of increased congressional membership for New York state which would mean a gain of one congressman. There are 43 congressmen from New York state at the present time. Proposals have been made for increasing this representation by one, two and four members.

Should the one-representative increase plan be carried out, or in fact irrespective of the additional congressmen which might be given to New York state, it was explained that its existing congressional district lines would probably be left unchanged. A reapportionment involving the entire state would tend to disturb the present equality between New York city and the remaining portion of the state. Twenty-four of the 43 congressmen sent to congress from this state are elected from districts which lie wholly or partly within New York city.

In the case of a reapportionment this number would undoubtedly be increased to the detriment of the districts lying upstate. It is provided in order to meet this condition to have one, two or four congressmen, as the case may be, to be elected in the entire state at large.

SOME RECIPES.

Salmon Loaf. One can salmon picked fine with fork, four eggs, four tablespoons butter, three-quarters cup bread crumbs, salt and pepper to taste. Combine the ingredients and steam one hour in a quart bowl. Serve with white sauce or egg sauce.

Shrimp Wiggle. Two cans of shrimp, one pint cream, one cup cooked rice, one-half can tomatoes, one tablespoon chopped onions, butter half the size of an egg. Cook onion in butter, add tomatoes and cooked rice; when hot add shrimp cut in thirds; add cream, season with salt and pepper and serve hot on crackers. Will serve 10 persons.
