POTSDAM WILL HAVE VAUDEVILLE

FIRST SHOWING HERE WILL BE ON FEBRUARY 13TH.

A vaudeville circuit in Northern New York is being formed, it became known today and Potsdam is included in the circuit. The bookings here will be under the management of Joseph P. Barnett and the first one will be on Monday, February 13th. The vaudeville feature on the opening night will be "Sawing a Lady in Half." It has been showing on the Keitts circuit and is secured in this section through a week's open dating. In addition, the multiple reel feature, "The Little Minister" will be shown together with a Charlie Chaplin comedy. There will be two programs at 7:30 and 9:15.

Among the other communities which will probably have vaudeville entertainment are Ogdensburg, Malone, Potsdam, Canton, Gouverneur and Lowville. The Plimmer agency has arranged a circuit of one night stands. The villages named have been unable to obtain the better class of vaudeville on account of the cost of these shows. Theater attendance would not warrant the presentation of the shows more than two days a week, it is believed by the booking agency. For this reason a circuit of six one night stands is being arranged.

In each town will be given five first class acts and a feature photoplay. This combination has hitherto been established in two Watertown theaters, the Palace and the Avon, with marked success.

The plan provides that on the same day every week a show will be presented in the towns. The agency as an illustration, cites Malone. If Monday is the day selected in the Franklin county seat, then a vaudeville show will be given there every day, and in Potsdam Tuesdays, etc.

In addition to these one night stands the Plimmer agency is booking the Palace theater in Watertown, the McFie theater in Rome, the Grand theater in Auburn, the Courtland theater in Cortland, the Madison theater in Oneida, and many others, changing the bill every Monday and Thursday.

It grew colder toward night and a light snow fell. The storm in the Watertown section and down the Black River valley was very much more severe and close to a foot of snow fell. In the Boonville area, railroads placed snow plows in operation. In this section the thaw reduced the amount of snow on the ground very materially.

Monday, however, a heavy snow set in, lasting the greater portion of the afternoon and depositing six to eight inches of wet, sticky snow throughout this section.
