HEAR EUROPE ON THE RADIO. HERE

CONDITIONS FAVORABLE FOR RECEPTION OF BIG NEW YEARS AIR FEATURES

After several nights of very poor reception until early morning hours, radio conditions in Potsdam on New Year's night were good enough to hear the European program broadcast from London, England, in the greatest hook up of broadcasting stations ever attempted on this continent.

After efforts to pick up and rebroadcast the program from 2LO, London, at the scheduled time, 6:45 to 7:15, had failed, WJZ did receive and rebroadcast at 7:30 o'clock another part of the 2LO program, music from the Club City, London, and New Year's greetings from England to America.

American listeners did not hear the important chimes but heard the musical program.

Failure to pick up 2LO during the critical period was due to unfavorable atmospheric conditions. The station was heard clearly at five o'clock and again in sufficient volume in the afternoon, but then faded and was rebroadcasting until 7:30.

The American program was heard and rebroadcast as successfully in England, according to a cable from the British Broadcasting Company, London, which said "WJZ heard OK, Chelmsford, Essex and London." Many ships in the Atlantic reported hearing both American and British programs clearly.

The official observer in Bermuda called WJZ as follows: "Radio reception very loud and clear, particularly WJZ. English broadcast also very clear."

From Havana an official observer advised officials in charge of the experiment that England had been heard although there was appreciable fading out.

The American program was distinctly heard. The Associated Press dispatches being "very interesting and every word clear." "Increase of power" the observer said, "eliminates to large extent effects of static so trouble some in tropics."

Buenos Aires reported that amateurs heard the program but not clearly because of heavy static.

Nine powerful stations in America were linked either by direct wire or short wave transmission, to set the program on the air. These stations, forming the first link in the "world wide broadcast," were augmented by powerful stations in England, hooked up through 2LO, London, to catch and

rebroadcast the program, while the Nation of LaNacion, Buenos Aires, also stood by to pick up the program and rebroadcast to South America.

American stations cooperating were WJZ, New York City and 2NAR, Bound Brook, N. J., linked as one station; WRC, Washington, D. C.; WGY, Schenectady; WBZ, Springfield, Mass.; KFKA, Pittsburg; KYW, Chicago; KFKX, Hastings, Neb.; KOA, Denver, Colo.; and Oakland, Cal.

David Sarnoff, vice president of the Radio Corporation of America gave an address pointing out the importance of the experiment. Consuls General of Egypt, France, Poland, Italy, Sweden and Japan spoke to their own people, and expressed greetings from their own people to all peoples of the earth. Interpreters were employed to overcome the difficulties of the difference in languages.

The features were solos by John McCormick, Tenor; L. Bori, Soprano; the Victor Symphony Orchestra, Godfrey Ludlow, violinist; The Eastman Theatre symphony orchestra; the Shannon Male quartette and Anton Brees, Carillonneur of the Park Avenue Baptist Church who rendered "Oh God Our Help in Ages Past," on the chimes of the church.

Kent Cooper, general manager of The Associated Press gave a brief address and then read news dispatches gathered via radio telegraph.

Dig Up Martyrs of 1684

An ancient coffin was recently unearthed in the Townhead district of Glasgow which contained the skeletonized remains of a man. The coffin was found some 15 feet behind the well-known Martyrs' monument, which fronts Castle street, a circumstance that gave rise to the theory that the remains were those of one of the three men—James Nisbet, James Lawson and Alexander Wood—who were martyred in 1684. The excavation process has disclosed only one grave, and it is suggested that the remains may be buried near the monument erected in 1818 and renewed in 1862. The three martyrs commemorated by the monument were apparently originally laid to rest in a piece of ground now of triangular shape situated behind James Nisbet street, but no longer marked as a spot of sanctity or sepulcher.
