

MRS. JAS. R. BILL DIES IN OGDENSBURG

SHE WAS A NATIVE OF POTSDAM BEING BORN HERE IN 1863

Mrs. Florence S. Bill wife of James R. Bill of Ogdensburg died at her home in Greys street in that city early Saturday morning. Mrs. Bill was a native of Potsdam where she was born April 21, 1863, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Seeley.

Her marriage to Mr. Bill occurred in Trinity church in this village February 22, 1887. Since that time, she had resided in Ogdensburg. Mrs. Bill had been in poor health for some time and her death was not unexpected.

She is survived by her husband, three daughters, Mrs. Frederic H. Taylor, Watertown, N. Y., Mrs. Harry B. Hiltz, Garden City, L. I., Mrs. Tyler G. Gregory, Syracuse, N. Y., and one brother, C. M. Seeley, Seattle, Wash.

The funeral was held from the home Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Services were conducted by Bishop J. D. Morrison, assisted by Ven. D. Charles White and Rev. W. C. Mulholland. Dr. Morrison last officiated with the late Dr. R. M. Kirby at Mrs. Bill's marriage. The remains were placed in the vault at the Ogdensburg cemetery.
