

# L. U. SMOTHERS TECH 51 TO 15

### CLARKSON UP BIG SCORE IN GAME AT CANTON

Clarkson College court quintet lost the big margin of 51 to 15 to St. Lawrence at Canton last Friday. The game was too one-sided to be interesting and all too early became a question of how large a margin the Scarlet could be able to pile up. The count at quint finished the game, with second string men sent in near the close of the second half with the score 14 to 14. Score at half time was 25 to 5.

Costello was high scorer for the team, totaling 12 points, 10 of them being scored from the floor. He was closely followed by Burkman with 11 points and Rhodes with 10. All three scored five baskets apiece. Captain Burkman of St. Lawrence played a masterful defense game, allowing his man to shoot one field basket and in addition setting the pace for the Scarlet offense.

Stewart playing at right forward for the Engineers was easily in a stellar role and about the only player to make any showing against the Scarlet defense by carrying the heat of the ineffective Clarkson attack. He scored seven of his team's 15 points.

Clarkson was noticeably weak from the foul line, registering only three out of 10 tries, while St. Lawrence scored on seven out of 12. The score at the end of the first half was 25.5 in favor of St. Lawrence.

#### First Half

O'Hare for Clarkson opened the scoring by a count from the foul line and the Green took a one-point lead for the first and only time during the evening. Costello tied the count at one all by dueling the shot. For a time both teams warily felt each other out with the Scarlet carrying the offensive. Burkman, St. Lawrence forward, broke through for the first field basket and followed it a few moments later with a second. St. Lawrence started its scoring rampage with baskets by Costello and Burkman, to be momentarily checked by Clarkson's first center from the floor, registered by Stewart. Two scores for the Scarlet followed in rapid succession by Rhodes. Haskell was substituted for

Rutherford at left guard and shortly after scored Clarkson's last count for half. Burkman and Costello tallied ringers for the home outfit and as the half ended Captain Papp dribbled the ball down the floor for the final count.

#### Second Half

The game which had tended to grow dull near the end of the first period because of its one-sidedness took a new lease on life and the second half started with a rush. Clarkson tried to force the pace, but the Scarlet scored four field baskets before Clark son lifted one from the floor for a count. The St. Lawrence stands began calling for a score of 50 points and Costello started the game toward the goal by lifting one through the net with one hand. Papp, content to wait now to play well back toward his basket, broke through the Green Kamp took advantage of Papp's brief loosening of his guard and eluded him to drop his only basket of the game. The Scarlet varsity nullified the score to 45-14, when Coach Knauss called them from the floor and sent in the entire second string.

The Brewer Field house was packed to capacity, the crowd being estimated at nearly 1,000. The Clarkson cohorts were present in full force to watch first their Freshmen team and then their varsity suffer defeat, but through out the spectacle they kept their voices going strong in spite of the few logical opportunities they had to cheer. The Engineers band was also on hand to add to the Clarkson coating and their several selections were greeted enthusiastically by both of the cheering sections.

## IN ROW OVER BILL FOR JUDGES

### CONGRESSMEN OPPOSE PLAN OF DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

The congressmen representing the eight congressional districts that make up the western judicial district of New York state met in the office of Congressman Clarence McGregor of Buffalo last week and discussed plans for blocking the plan of the justice department to have one additional judge appointed to work in both the western and northern judicial districts of New York instead of carrying out the plan for appointing an additional judge in each district as provided for in bills introduced in the house by Congressman Dempsey of Lockport, Jacobstein of Rochester Magee of Syracuse and Snell of Potsdam.

Those attending the conference in addition to McGregor, Dempsey and Jacobstein, were Mead of Buffalo, Reed of Dunkirk, Sanders of Stafford, Stalker of Elmira and Taben of Auburn.

Last year the house judiciary committee after holding hearings on both bills decided against the Jacobstein bill but favorably reported the Dempsey bill. It failed of passage, however, before the congress session adjourned last March.

#### Referred To Department.

As soon as the Jacobstein Dempsey Magee and Snell bills were introduced when this Congress session met last December the house judiciary committee referred all four to the justice department for a recommendation. The attorney general responded with a recommendation that all four bills be abandoned and that a bill be passed appointing one additional judge to serve part time in both the western and northern districts. All the congressmen representing both the western and northern New York judicial districts are opposed to the justice department plan.

#### Would Split District In Two.

Jacobstein has been urging the house judiciary committee to pass his bill providing for splitting the western district in half and appointing another judge for the new district to be composed of the eastern end of the present western district.

The seven other western New York congressmen have been urging passage of the Dempsey bill to appoint an additional judge for the western district.

Jacobstein has now abandoned his bill and is backing the Dempsey bill also.

#### To Demand Hearing

Those attending the conference unanimously decided to support the Dempsey bill, agreed to demand a full public hearing before the house judiciary committee on the Dempsey bill, and adopted a suggestion that telegrams and letters be sent to local bar associations and other parties all over western New York interested in getting an additional judge urging that they make preparations to appear at the hearing and urge adoption of the Dempsey bill.

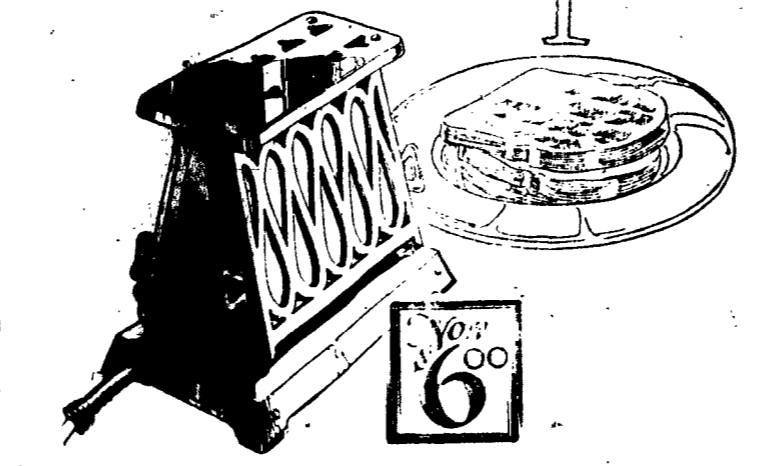
