The net cash price to be paid the members of the Sheffield Producers Cooperative Association, Inc., for the three per cent grade B milk delivered by them in the month of December is \$1.27 per hundred pounds in the 20-21 mile zone with the usual freight, grade and butterfat differentials. This is the same as \$1.47 for milk sold on a 2.5% butterfat basis. This is the lowest price paid Sheffield dairymen in many years and is bound to result in hardship and distress.

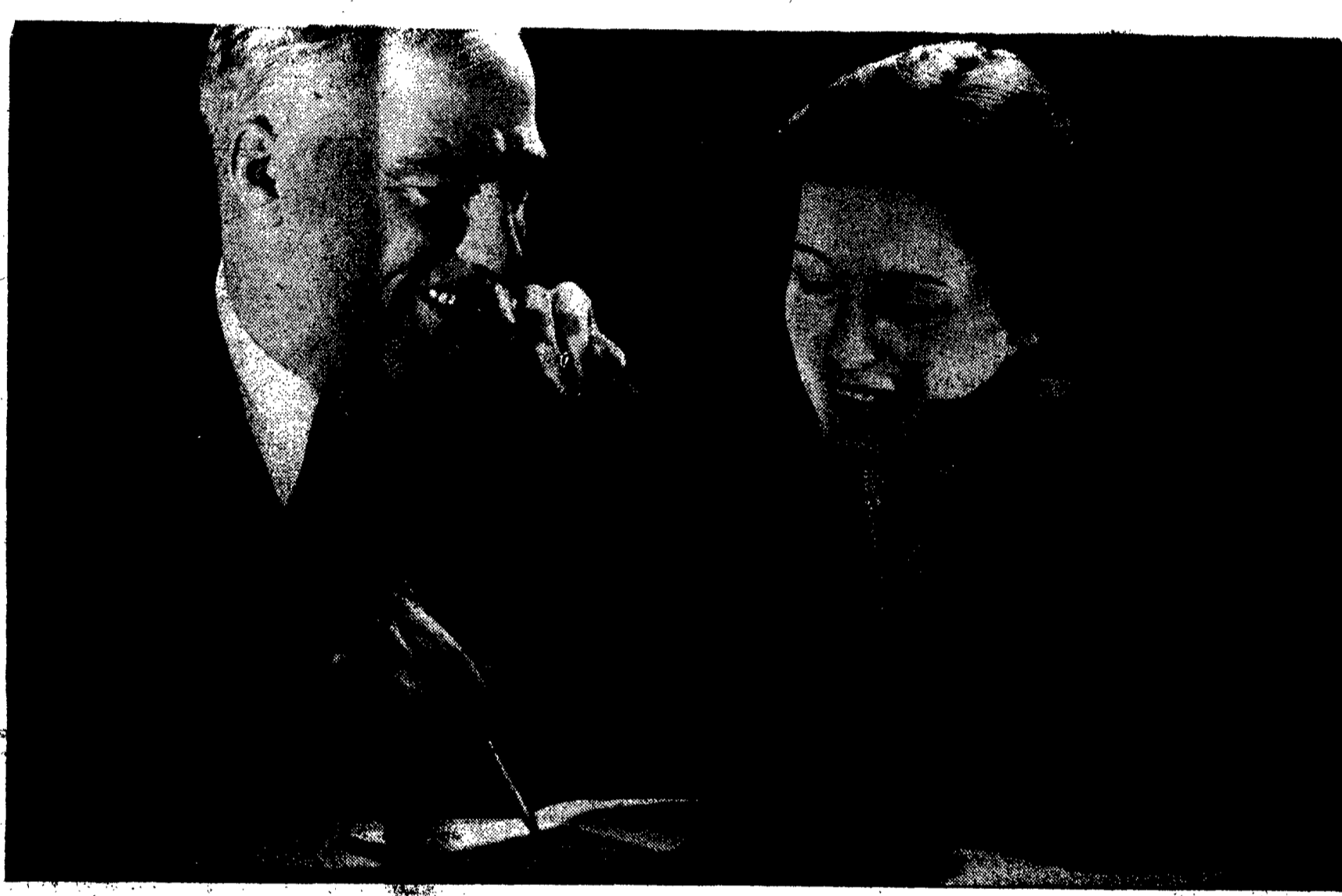
