

Normal Glee Club Scores Hit In Concert

The male Glee Club of the Normal School presented its annual Junior Prom Concert at the school auditorium on Friday evening, Jan. 9, to an enthusiastic audience of moderate size. Horace B. Bowman conducted, with Norman Mealy at the piano, and Laura Meyers, Sylvia Mabbett, and Charles Biondo, as soloists. Also listed on the program was the Male Quartet, composed of Logere, Thompson, Jack Smead, Wendall Phillips and Harry Spill, and as a guest club, the Clarkson College Glee Club, in its first appearance.

The program opened with Orlando Di Lasso's "My Heart Commends Itself to Thee," the Howarth arrangement of Borovinsky's "Vesper Hymn," and a簧簧wald arrangement of the popular folk-tune "Comin' Thru the Rye." In this latter number, Miss Meyers appeared as soloist in a most pleasing presentation of the song.

Then followed a piano solo by Mr. Mealy, the club's accompanist. He played Schumann's "Sonata" with considerable vigor and good taste.

The Clarkson Glee Club, while Mr. Bowman also directs, sang the popular "Kentucky Babe" by Geibel and two spirituals, "Steppin' Away" and "O Mary, Don't You Weep." Theodore Gilbert played this club's accompaniments. The club did exceedingly well for its first appearance, and we hope to have the pleasure of hearing more and greater things from it.

Mr. Biondo rendered Kreisler's "Caprice Viennoise" as a violin solo, displaying a beautiful tone and careful technique.

The Normal School Glee Club returned with a well arranged set of familiar airs in Gilbert's "Scottish Fantasia," and the gang the "Italian Street Song" from Victor Herbert's "Naught, Marietta" with Miss Mabbett a soloist.

Probably the hit of the evening, as far as entertainment goes, was the Male Quartet which next sang Edwards' "Into the Night" and the Bartholomew arrangement of the spiritual "Keep in the Middle of the Road." So popular were these numbers that two encores were demanded by the audience.

The Glee Club continued the program with another Ringwald arrangement of "Believe Me II." All these Endeavour Young Pharms' and the very humorous "Italian Salad."

The concluding number on the program was Whittaker's "I Am An American," sung by the combined clubs, and the two school songs.

The program was well balanced and definitely designed to please all tastes. Mr. Bowman is to be commended for his excellent training, and the singers deserve considerable credit for their part.

The report by the inspector will testify as to whether the applicant's tire or tires are unsafe and whether they can be repaired or whether a new tire is necessary. The applicant will then take the application to the rationing board. If, in the opinion of the board, after close examination, the applicant is approved as coming within the eligible class, the board will issue a certificate to the applicant for the purchase of the tire or tires.

Each county has been given a quota of tires by the office of price administration and this quota for January has been transmitted through the state bureau of rationing. Each board will be allowed to issue certificates only within its quota. In cases where more applications are received than the quota permits, the office of price administration has ruled that the choices deemed most necessary by the local board are to receive preference.

The quotas for each county will be issued on a month-to-month basis and there will be no surpluses carried over. It is expected that during any week of any month, a tire rationing board will use up not more than 25 per cent of its quota of tires for that month.

Under the regulations set up, the local board will report to the state bureau of rationing, Albany, directed by Dr. Maurice F. Neufeld. The state office will notify each tire rationing board on the 15th of each month of its quota for the following month. A report on the tire certificates rejected and approved will be made by the local board to the state bureau on a monthly basis.
