Postal Workers Higher Pay Bill Reaches Senate

Favorable reception of the postal reclassification bill on which the U. S. senate post office committee opened hearings was asked in a wire sent by Mrs. Ruth E. Perrin, Potsdam postmaster and a director of the New York state branch of the National Association of Postmasters, to Senator Kenneth McKellar, chairman of the senate committee.

The bill would revise the salaries of postal employees upwards by \$400, provide for the payment of time and one-half for overtime, and make an adjustment with respect to seniority rights.

This bill was passed by the House of Representatives 360 to 1. The lone vote against it was cast by a congressman in a western rural state. Both parties are supporting the bill and passage is expected. Proponents of the measure in both political parties regard it as an overdue measure of justice for these essential workers.

The upstate U. S. senator, Sen. James M. Mead of Buffalo, is working for the bill's passage.
