With the 12th AAF in Italy — thirty six months from New York are serving with Headquarters of the 12th Air Force when from D-Day in North Africa until V-Day in Italy — from November 8, 1942, until May 2, 1945 — they fought for Allied ground and air forces in the battles for North Africa, Sicily, Sarinina, Corsica, the Balkans, Southern France and Italy.

CPL. OLIVER CHOSE WITH "FLYING JEEPS"

With the Fifteenth United States Army in Germany — they call their planes "Flying Jeeps" and loop around the skies chauffeur, escorting from civilian and military dignitaries to wounded fighting men, these boys of the 158th Liaison Squadron, now part of Lieutenant General Leonard T. Gerow's Fifteenth U. S. Army.

Their sole armor comprises a hip-straddling 45 cal. automatic pistol and they fly without benefit of parachute, but the 15 officers and 125 enlisted men who make up this squadron can outmaneuver any enemy fighter. The Stinson L-5 they pilot can climb a swift steep angle from an unusually short takeoff, bank down-side clouds and land on a foot-path. It can reach a speed of 112 miles per hour over a 300 mile range.

Pastures Improve As Hot Weather Warms Ground

The hot weather and frequent showers of the past week has so improved the rich grass lands of St. Lawrence county that milk production, which had started to drop, is on the upturn again.

Because of the cold, wet weather which held through early and late spring, the grass on the pastures of the dairy farms was short, full of water and had little food value. Farmers were perturbed a week ago when production started to drop slightly. This was contrary to the usual order of events as June, July and August are the "flush" production months.

The spring rains kept pastures so soft that the cows churned them up as though they were meadows, further reducing grass growth. While a large area of grass pasture was stunted for the summer this way, on most pastures the hot sun and the showers are rectifying this condition, and the grass itself has a greater animal food content. In fact, the grass is getting what is described locally as lush.

Improvement in the grass growth has aided dairy farmers and the milk industry in general, but vegetable gardens are still behind. Farmers in all of Eastern St. Lawrence county have found to their dismay that there weren't any seed potatoes available at any price. Farmers have searched as far east as Malone without being able to buy a potato. Tubers are no longer available at grocers either. This is regarded as very serious. The early Virginia crop was frozen in the ground this year, and the early Long Island crop is not doing at all well, so local and imported potatoes are expected to be in the luxury item class this fall. The few bushels that have been sold brought a luxury price already.
