Larry Hervieux In Noted 753rd Tank Battalion

T-5 Larry Hervieux, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Hervieux, Route 3, Potsdam, is serving with the famous 753rd Tank Battalion. He has been in service since April 21, 1942.

June 1st marked the fourth anniversary of the 753rd Tank Battalion. It was one of the first ten tank battalions organized by the War Department in 1941.

The 753rd left the United States on 24 April 1943 and, after a short stay in Sicily, landed on the shores of Sicily on D-Day with the 45th Division. Since that day, the 753rd has fought in Sicily, Italy, France, Germany and Austria. It has participated in five amphibious landings, served in two armies, seven corps, and has fought with fifteen different divisions. The tank battalion has seen 486 combat days.

On the occasion of the fourth anniversary, Maj. Charles L. McNeill, Commanding Officer, sent the following memorandum to his men: "We had to learn our tanking by doing it. Thanks to the keenness, the agility of mind, the aggressiveness and initiative of our officers and enlisted men we learned well enough to beat the Germans at every turn—on the beaches, in the mountains, in the forests and on the plains. Considering the types of actions we have fought, our losses have been extremely light."

This is to the credit of our officers and non-commissioned officers for the training given our men; and to the men themselves for the interest and the hard work displayed in the absorption of this training."
