Much time and effort is required in preparing carnivorous animals for sale and shipment, as well as the refrigeration of the meat for his own animals' consumption during the winter. All spare moments are used in fulfilling contracts to poultry raisers for bone meal—shipments often being made to more than ten lots.

Mr. Liberty was formerly connected with CCC camp 95 at Brasher Falls, as junior foreman on the technical staff, he later did clerical work at No. 140, at the Massena aluminum plant. Sept. 16, 1940, he married Miss Helen Hall, R. N., daughter of Isaac and Minnie McCarty Hall of Brasher Falls. They purchased their present property in Winthrop of Mrs. Hattie S. Smith in March, 1943, this includes a large house, barn and several acres of land, which are essential to his enterprise.
