## John Hosmer Dies; Was Tax Collector

Final rites for John Shirley Hosmer, 82, were held on Monday, Jan. 1, at the home of his daughter, Miss Helen M. Hosmer, 48 Elm St., where he died Saturday, Dec. 30. The Rev. J. Murray Atwood, D. D., dean of the theological school of St. Lawrence University, Canton, officiated. He was assisted by the Rev. J. Thurston Travis, rector of Trinity Church.

Burial was at Bayside Cemetery. Mr. Hosmer was born at 12 Bay St. on Dec. 6, 1868, the son of Merrill and Achsa Sayles Hosmer. He attended Potsdam Normal School from 1884 to 1888, leaving six months before he was to be graduated. For several years after 1892 he played professional baseball.

From 1895 to 1906 he worked in Albany for the state department of agriculture and treasury department. On July 8, 1897, he married Miss Susan Charlotte Couzens of Yonkers.

From 1920 to 1926 Mr. Hosmer served as tax collector in Potsdam.

He is survived by two daughters, Miss Helen Margaret Hosmer, and Mrs. Kenneth H. (Susan Winifred) Taylor, Maplewood, N. J.; a brother, Sumner Hosmer, 12 Bay St., and two granddaughters, Mrs. Frederick D. Arnst and Miss Helen Diane Taylor.

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## Christmas Seal Sale Approaches Quota

With returns approaching the quota, Christmas Seal Sale officials this week hoped to reach their goal. The sum reported by Julius Frank, county seal sale chairman, was \$10,538.59, about \$1000 under the quota.

Mr. Frank reported to E. E. Wright, president of the St. Lawrence County Tuberculosis and Public Health Assn., which is conducting the sale.

Mr. Frank emphasized that the bulk of the money came from contributors through the mail. "Preliminary figures show that the total sum represents 7809 individual contributors, indicating a widespread response to the 1950 appeal for funds to finance the tuberculosis prevention and control work of our association during the coming year," Mr. Frank reported. "The association owes a vote of thanks to the residents of St. Lawrence County for this vote of confidence in its year-round work."

Corporal Hanson was cited for his efforts in moving supplies from Pusan to the front.

The citation read in part: "Upon his arrival in Pusan, Corporal Hanson was placed in charge of 50 Korean laborers, including ammunition from incoming ships and loading it onto railroad cars for shipment to the front. He worked day and night, taking only a few minutes rest, and kept up this procedure until replacement arrived."

The soldier has attended army schools in Japan. A brother, R. James Hanson, is serving with an engineering unit at Fort Belvoir, Va.
