Glenn Gale, 60, Dies In Veterans Hospital

Colton—Funeral services were held Friday morning at 9 o'clock in Holy Name Church, Faust, for Glenn N. Gale, 60, superintendent of utilities for the village of Tupper Lake, who died Monday night at 9 at the U. S. Veterans Administration Hospital, Sunmount.

On leave of absence since his health began to fail last April, Mr. Gale was under treatment five weeks at the Saranac Lake General Hospital before being admitted to Sunmount Hospital six weeks ago. The body was taken to the Richer funeral home at Tupper Lake, until the services on Friday. It was placed in St. Mary's Cemetery vault, Potsdam, to await burial in St. Patrick's Cemetery in Colton in the spring.

Mr. Gale was born at Gale on Dec. 22, 1890, the son of Emery Gale, pioneer settler and hotel operator, and Mary Hamblin Gale.

After his graduation from Colton High School, Mr. Gale attended Clarkson College, graduating with a degree in electrical engineering as a member of the class of 1913.

For 16 years he was employed by Henry L. Doherty and Company of New York in the construction engineering department. Later he worked for various construction firms and operated the Gale cabins before coming to Tupper Lake as utilities superintendent five years ago.

Mr. Gale was a veteran of World War I and saw 18 months of sea duty in the Atlantic aboard the destroyer U.S.S. Cunningham. He was affiliated with Omicron Pi Omicron fraternity at Clarkson and with the Tupper Lake Rotary Club.

Surviving are his wife, the former Miss Nettie Spears of Colton whom he married Aug. 22, 1922, a daughter, Mrs. Jane Hutchins, and a grandson, Michael Glenn Hutchins, all of Tupper Lake.
