Minimum Rate for COIN TELEPHONE CALLS BECOMES 10¢

First Increase in 60 Years

On Saturday, January 6, the minimum rate for calls from New York Telephone Company coin telephones will become 10¢, as authorized by the Public Service Commission in the general increase in telephone rates granted last May. This is the first increase in the minimum rate in coin telephone history. Only calls within the present 5¢ calling area will be affected by the change. Calls that are a dime today will still be a dime tomorrow. Thus, the new 10¢ calling area will include both the present 5¢ and 10¢ areas.

remained 5¢ until now. The costs of providing telephone service have increased sharply since then. When higher schedules of telephone rates were found necessary last May to meet these higher costs, it seemed only fair that users of coin telephone service should bear their share of the increase.

It is interesting to compare what has happened to other prices during the 45-year life of the nickel call. Here are a few typical examples:

2% Surcharge Eliminated from Telephone Bills
At the same time, customers' bills for local service and facilities will be reduced by the elimination of the temporary 2% surcharge. This surcharge was a temporary charge authorized last May in order to provide the Telephone Company with needed revenue during the period required to make the necessary mechanical changes in coin telephone equipment.

First Increase in the Minimum Rate in Coin Telephone History
In 1906, the minimum rate for calls from coin telephones was reduced from 10¢ to 5¢ and has
