Fluid Milk Price Placed at \$5.78

New York—The January price of fluid milk (Class 1-A) produced for the New York metropolitan milk marketing area will be \$5.78 a hundredweight (46.5 quarts), it was announced this week by Dr. C. J. Blanford, the market administrator. The price for December is \$5.81 a hundredweight. In January, 1950, it was \$4.80.

Dr. Blanford pointed out that dairy farmers are never paid the Class 1-A price. Handlers pay that price to the New York pool for the milk they use in that category. In turn, dairy farmers are paid a uniform price which is determined by the use of all milk received at country plants approved for the New York marketing area.

The Class 1-A price is determined monthly by a formula which considers general economic conditions as shown in the index of wholesale commodity prices published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics; milk supply and demand factors, and seasonality.

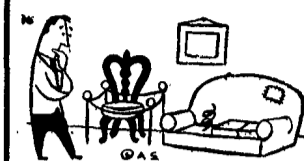

You'll find the job won't take as long or be so arduous as you think. That inventory and the insurance policy, after it has been issued, should, if possible, be kept in a safe deposit box. Then, if you ever have a fire, you can check against the inventory and determine your exact loss.
