Centralization Brings Best in Education, Director Says; Discusses Norwood Plans

Norwood—On June 17, 1949, the residents of this area voted to centralize the Norwood-Norfolk school district. This district takes in parts of the towns of Norfolk, Potsdam, Madrid, Stockholm and Louisville. The result showed 80 percent in favor of working together as a central district to solve educational problems.

The primary purpose of the voters for centralization was to give every boy and girl in our district the best education possible to prepare themselves for the future. The agreement to centralize the 17 districts was a beginning step in the centralization program. The next organizational step was to

build and remodel in order to provide modern educational plants which would meet present elementary school needs. The Milmo-Halpern law, which was approved by the 1949 session of the legislature, will make the financing program possible at this time. At least two-thirds of the cost of the proposed building program will be paid by the state.

On Sept. 14, 1950 the qualified voters of the central school district went to the polls to vote on the site of the proposed junior-senior high school building. Two sites were put before the voters, the Smith-Raymond property on the Norwood-Norfolk highway and the McGregor property on the Norfolk - Raymondville highway. The vote approved the Smith-Raymond site located midway between the two villages.

The proposed building will be available as a community center for adults as well as students. It will be a tremendous factor in building friendships and understanding throughout the district.

The district, under a favorable central school state aid plan, will be assigned a building quota. This is a percentage of the cost of the construction and will be paid each year by the state. In the case of the Norwood - Norfolk building program, the state will pay two-thirds of the cost of the building, the rest will be paid by the local school district. This rate of assistance is one of the highest ever computed by the state education department.

The cost of the proposed program, based on architects' study and the experience of the state education department, will be \$1,400,000. Broken down into \$1,335,000 for the new building and grounds and \$65,000 for conversion of present buildings for use as grade schools. When the districts centralized, a part of surplus funds on hand in some of the districts was turned over to the central district. This has been retained and added to. Part of this surplus will be used to pay the district's share of the interest and bond payments for the first year and one-half after each bond issue is sold.

The district will sell bonds to the amount of \$1,400,000 to cover the actual cost of construction. These building bonds will mature over a 30-year period. The bonds issued for the conversion of present buildings will mature over a 10-year period. Estimates of interest rates are low, ranging from 1.75 to 2.25 percent.

The proposed junior-senior high school building will include such items as a machine shop, facilities for agriculture, home economics, industrial arts, physical education, an auditorium, cafeteria and a modern garage to store and service buses.

Qualifications for voting on a school decision are liberal. One may vote if he owns property in the Norwood - Norfolk Central school district and if one is a parent and has a child attending school in the Norwood - Norfolk Central School District.

The final decision now rests upon the voters, who went to the polls in the Norwood Music Hall yesterday to vote on the proposed building.
