New Scholarship For County Boy Revealed by SLU

Canton — Establishment of a new Floyd G. Hitchcock scholarship at St. Lawrence University, named for and contributed by and on behalf of a St. Lawrence graduate in the class of 1908, has been announced by President Eugene G. Bewkes.
The scholarship fund of \$6400 will be used to provide an annual scholarship of \$250 for a young man residing in St. Lawrence county, to be chosen by the university scholarship committee. The scholarship may be given each year for four years and will continue to be awarded as long as the fund exists.
Floyd G. Hitchcock, Detroit, an alumnus and trustee of St. Lawrence, retired last month after more than 40 years association with the S. S. Kresge Company. Realizing that a testimonial dinner to be given by his friends would be accompanied by a gift or gifts, Mr. Hitchcock requested that the money which might have been used for such gifts be used to establish the scholarship fund at his alma mater.
Mr. Hitchcock received \$2800 at the testimonial dinner, in the Waldorf-Astoria hotel in New York Dec. 7, and turned this over to the university for the scholarship. Subsequent gifts from other friends raised the total to \$6400.
The first scholarship award will be given for the year beginning next September. Additional contributions may be made to and accepted by the fund at any time.
