Tech 5 Trips Toronto, 67-47

Herb Jahn emerged on Friday night and pushed in 25 points to pace Clarkson College's hosters in a 67 to 47 victory over the University of Toronto in the Clarkson gym. It was the fourth victory of the current season for the Golden Knights.

At the half, Hank Hodge's men were on the low end of a 32 to 17 score and early in the third quarter decisively sewed up the contest. The Techmen score 14 points in the third, Jahn getting 12 of this total, but only after the margin had been whittled down to six points through the efforts of the Torontoans.

The Clarkson reserves came in at this point of the third and led the visitors by as much as 25 points during the remainder of the game.

Lee Colavito followed Jahn in the scoring column, getting 16 tallies for the afternoon. Stu Landersman followed with 12 points to his credit.

Knight Skaters Swamp Williams

The sons of Eph Williams floundered in their second North Country defeat in two starts on Saturday night on Clarkson Ave. before the hard-skating, dexterous puckchasers from Clarkson College 10 to 1. Still groggy from a 7 to 2 licking at the hands of St. Lawrence University in Lake Placid Friday night, Williams was no match for the Golden Knights who shot, backpassed and checked their way into their second victory of the current season.

As time progressed, the Golden Knights came more and more into possession of the game. In the first 20 minutes they scored twice, in the second, three times, and in the final stanza, they pushed the puck into the nets five times. Williams' lone score came in the third period.

Bill Munro was the standout for the Engineers. He scored five goals during the evening and played with Williams' defense-men like a cat toying with a crew of ineffectual mice.

Among the icemen from Williams town, Mass., Herb Poole, a valiant netminder, played a bang-up game against irrevocable odds, finally succumbing to a worn kneecap in the second period. He joined the Williams bench warmers only after having earned the cheers of a partisan crowd for a series of fabulous saves.

The contest began with a bang as Munro, assisted by Ken Brown and Al Siddall, scored at 1:15, showing off the potent playmaking ability of Bill Harrison's first line.

The Tech defense was shown to be well caulked a few minutes later as it held off a series of attacks which flourished while Bill Drummond and Boomer Weedmark languished in the penalty box for boarding.

At 10:50 Clarkson broke into the scoring column again. Dick Washburn grabbed a Ken Brown pass on the wing just over the Williams blue line and faked the opposition out of position. It was the last tally of the period.

The Williams defenses held strongly through the first half of the second period as rooler Poole held off Clarkson shooters with his stick, pads, gloves and skates. He was replaced at 10:50 by Art Hudson who did not fare as well.

Munro slapped one in at 13:40 with the aid of Stan Moore and repeated the operation at 14:55, Moore and Siddall assisting.

With John Nelson relaxing in the hoosegow for tripping, Moore scored at 18:00 with Munro and Siddall again providing his momentary aid.

As the hexagon gruffly marked the end of the period, Williams' John Malcolm netted the puck for the visitors, but it was disallowed by the officials who ruled that time had run out before it was shot.

Clarkson's passing and razzle-dazzle broke the backs of the Williams visitors in the third. Munro took a backpass in front of the cage from Moore, who had taken a pass from Siddall, and scored at 1:40.

John Beard, abetted by John Pike and Dave Pierson, netted the only goal for the visitors at 2:20. After some bone-shaking play in Williams' territory, Munro tallied his fifth of the evening by taking a rebound out of a scramble in front of the cage into which Moore had blasted the puck.

Moore scored two more at 6:43 and 11:50, assisted by Munro and Drummond in the first, and with no aid in the second.

To complete the rout Bob Flaherty, assisted by Washburn and Doug Brown, broke through at 14:40 to cap the evening's entertainment for the Techmen.

A fast-breaking, powerful attack by the St. Lawrence University sextet befuddled Clarkson College's hockey team Tuesday night in the Clarkson arena, and beat it out, 5 to 1, in a game which featured two major alterations involving fisticuffs, hard body work by both teams and a legion of penalties.

Paced by Bob Borab and Neil Staripoli, the visitors forced the contest all the way. Defensively they bottled up the Clarkson attack with an unbreachable wall around the nets. Offensively, the wall broke into a powerful attack whenever it gained possession of the puck. Many times it seemed that the number of St. Lawrence players on the ice was double that furnished by the Golden Knights.

The contest tempo was fluid in the first minute of play. Both teams moved fast, but SLU was the first to score. Borab, assisted by Arnie Larsen and Bill Anck, netted the initial tally at 5:37.

Bill Drummond was carried off the ice soon after with a sprained ankle received when he collided with the boards in back of the Clarkson goal. Anck was carried from the rink several minutes later following a head-on collision. He returned for duty in the second period.

The second St. Lawrence score was by Staripoli with an assist to Borab at 15:04. At the time, Boomer Weedmark was in the penalty box for illegal checking.

The second period was marked by two fights and the lone Clarkson goal of the evening. Because of a rhubarb in front of the SLU goal, Dick Washburn and Anck were ejected for fighting with five-minute major penalties. Murray Beach and Gene Del Vecchio were each handed two minutes for roughing. Del Vecchio, the SLU goaler, had a substitute serve his time.

With each team having but four men on the ice, Clarkson's Bill Munro netted the Clarkson score at 6:04. He was aided by Weedmark and Al Siddall.

Not many minutes later, Del Vecchio was awarded another five-minute sentence for having taken a poke at Doug Brown. Brown was sentenced to two minutes in duration vile for his part in the affair.

But the three-minute one-man advantage which Clarkson received from the exchange of blows could gain them no more points. It seemed only to have put off the trouncing Clarkson took in the final stanza of the hockey game.

All hopes for the Engineers were scattered in the third frame as SLU dominated play throughout the period. Staripoli scored at 2:24. Meanwhile, Clarkson made a sortie into enemy territory, but each time could shoot only once before the SLU defense took over and brought the puck into Green and Gold ice.

Lou Lento, abetted by Jim Weeden and Staripoli, netted another marker at 15:33 and Borab, assisted by Bob Scott, put the finishing touches on the evening's work at 17:30 when he racked up St. Lawrence's fifth goal of the rout.
