Sheriff Reports 64 December Arrests

During December, the office of the St. Lawrence County Sheriff made 64 arrests according to a report released last week. Broken down, the total contained 41 arrests for vehicle and traffic violations, 15 for misdemeanors, eight for vehicle and traffic misdemeanors, two for conservation offenses and one arrest was made for a felony.

Fines totaling \$322.50 were paid; \$82.50 in fines was suspended. Four juveniles were reported during the period three cars were reported stolen and 10 miscellaneous complaints were received. A total of 15 accidents were reported to the office. All complaints were investigated.

The office collected \$808.75 in civil fees, served 136 papers and executed 96, the sheriff's report shows.

The jail admitted 33 persons over 21 years old and four under that age. Officers took 67 sets of fingerprints at the jail. At its peak, the jail contained 34 persons; the low for the month was 17. One person was arrested in another county and returned to the jail.

On criminal and civil business, the sheriff's car traveled 1243 miles; the deputies' cars traveled 13,466 miles. Total mileage for the vehicles was 14,709.

The night patrol covered 3216 miles of highway during the month, checked 189 vehicles for equipment and licenses and made 15 arrests for vehicle and traffic violations.

The patrol arrested two persons for offenses and ordinance violations, one person for another department and made an arrest on a child's court warrant.

It investigated four accidents. Violators paid \$70 in fines; \$10 in fines was suspended.

The patrol investigated 10 complaints, policed five dances and one fire and served 32 papers. Two cars, valued at \$3600, were recovered by the night patrol.
