Mr. Dow had been in his usual good health and was preparing to go to work at the St. Lawrence Paper Mill, Norfolk, when he suffered a cerebral hemorrhage at his home. He was removed to Potsdam Hospital in Buck's ambulance, where he died a few hours later on Friday night, Dec. 29.

Mr. Dow was born July 26, 1902 in Oswego. He was the son of Charles and Sarah Campbell Dow of North Stockholm. He spent most of his life in this vicinity.

Besides his wife, Mr. Dow is survived by his mother, Mrs. Sarah Campbell Dow, who is now residing at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Chase at North Stockholm. She lived with her son the past two years, and was with him when he was taken ill.
