Tech Sextet Braces For Dartmouth Gray

The Blue Green from the hills of New Hampshire will roll into town Friday night to face Clarkson's puckchasers in one of the big games of the year for the Tech sextet. Famed in the Eastern Intercollegiate Hockey League, Dartmouth always has a powerful club with members drawn mainly from the Green Mountain school loop and the blue ice section of Northern New England and Canada.

For Coach Bill Harrison of the Golden Knights the game has a double significance. When a star at Dartmouth, Harrison was a member of the great Indian team of 1941-42 and 1942-43 which compiled a record of 33 victories without a defeat. Clarkson will play against a team coached by Harrison's mentor in his college days.

Six minutes of the first period had passed when Doug Brown opened the scoring by slapping the puck past goalie Bob Holland. Dave McMahon evened up the match at 8:37 and Ely Rowland grabbed a pass from McMahon at 11:35 to put the visitors in the lead.

But at 15:20 Munro deadlocked the tilt again on an assist from Moore and Doug Brown. Dick Malkin, shooting the puck from the blue line at 18:51, gave Colgate a one point edge at the end of the period.

In the second frame Clarkson's pressure gave the Golden Knights three goals to Colgate's one. Munro tied up the count at 1:46 of the period when he took a pass from Moore and rifled it into the nets. At 8:52 defenseman Murray Beach pushed his club into the lead again by stealing the puck from Rene Lavallee, passing to Bob Flaherty, grabbing a return from Al Siddall and driving it into the goal.

With two Techmen resting in the penalty box, Dick Rolston scored unassisted at 15:30 to tie the match again. But Moore put the winners into the lead five seconds later when he grabbed the rubber out of the faceoff and faked out Holland. The score stood 5 to 4 when the klaxon sounded.
