Sees \$4.86 Price For January Milk

New York — A uniform price of \$4.86 a hundredweight will be paid to dairy farmers for their January deliveries to pool-approved plants in the six-state New York milkshed, according to a forecast released today by Dr. C. J. Blanford, market administrator of the New York metropolitan milk marketing area.
He estimated at the same time that the producer butterfat differential for January would be 5.8 cents for each tenth of a pound of fat above or below the 3.5 percent standard.
Dr. Blanford said the forecast is based on a production estimate of 487 million pounds for the month. This would mean an average daily output of 312 pounds by each of the estimated 50,200 producers in the milkshed.
Handlers must submit reports to the administrator on the use made of their milk receipts for January not later than Feb. 10.

Civil Service Commission Has 6 Months To Federalize New York Milk Market

and the announced opposition of the Agriculture Department.
A spokesman for the New York milk market said Dr. Blanford is having trouble in getting or holding employees, because of the uncertainty over their Civil Service status.
Under instructions given to the department by the Civil Service Commission, transfer of some 150 employees in the independent setup of Dr. Charles J. Blanford, New York milk administrator, is scheduled to be completed by July 1.
Civil Service Commission contends these instructions have not been rescinded, nor has Agriculture Secretary Charles F. Brannan taken any action on them.
The Agriculture Secretary assured Senator Herbert H. Lehman (D-N.Y.) in July, and again in October, that he would not take any action toward "federalizing" the New York milkshed without "prior consultation" with the Senator. Lehman reiterated that assurance today.
The Senator said on July 28 that he was going to talk to the Civil Service Commission about the proposed transfer, but he has not consulted the Commission as yet.
"I undoubtedly will confer with them," Lehman said today. "I have told them I want to discuss the matter."
However, no appointment has been arranged, and the Senator said he had received no further correspondence from the Commission regarding the status of the New York milk market employees.
There is considerable speculation now among New York State dairy farmers as to whether Civil Service Commission will insist upon its transfer order despite objections by both Senators Lehman and Irving M. Ives (R-N.Y.).

Some are "lingering around" for jobs in private industry. Meanwhile, talk of the resignation or dismissal of Brannan as agriculture secretary, which flourished after Nov. 7 election, is abating in Washington.
President Truman endorsed the Brannan farm plan—a controversial issue in recent elections which is credited with helping to defeat some Democratic Congressmen—all over again in his 1952 budget message.
Under a section in the budget message dealing with the farm program, President Truman said: "While commodity inventories are currently proving to be more valuable in meeting increasing needs for foods and fibers, losses have occurred in the disposal of a number of perishable commodities, and further losses are expected to occur in 1952."
"To avoid unnecessary accumulation and loss of perishable agriculture commodities, legislation is needed to permit direct payments to producers in lieu of market price supports, through government purchases."
