

Nicholville Fire Station Opens; Town Supervisors, Vols Dine

Nicholville — At the official opening of its new fire station, the Nicholville Volunteer Fire Company entertained the town boards of Lawrence and Hopkinton Friday night at a supper served by wives of the firemen in the hall above the new building.

James J. Doyle of Potsdam spoke to the 35 members and guests, urging the St. Lawrence Board of Supervisors to appropriate money for the mutual aid program.

Chief George Fisk Jr., Nicholville, introduced Supervisors E. L. Crump of Lawrenceville and Roy E. Knapp, Hopkinton. Mr. Crump presented the fire department with a check for \$1000 covering the one-year payment to the group for fighting fires in the Town of Lawrence. The Nicholville department has a five-year contract with the town.

Other guests were Harris Dahy, chief of the new Hopkinton Fire Department, and Edgar Wagener, assistant chief at Hopkinton.

The new Nicholville station is on Water St., between the Hilltop Hotel and the Methodist church. It is a two-story cement block building fashioned according to Underwriter's Laboratory specifications. Much of the labor and materials for its construction was contributed.

Since the company's incorporation on May 24, 1950, it has answered eight calls. The area serviced by the department includes the Town of Lawrence and that part of the Town of Hopkinton directly across the St. Regis River from Nicholville.
