Blanford Sets \$5.84 As February Milk Price

New York — The February price of fluid milk (Class 1-A) produced for the New York metropolitan milk marketing area will be \$5.84 a hundredweight (46.5 quarts), it was announced last week by Dr. C. J. Blanford, the Market Administrator. The price for January is \$5.78 a hundredweight. In February, 1950, it was \$4.80.

Dr. Blanford pointed out that dairy farmers are never paid the class 1-A price. Handlers pay that price to the New York pool for the milk they use in that category. In turn, dairy farmers are paid a uniform price which is determined by the use made of all milk received at country plants approved for the New York marketing area.

The Class 1-A price is determined monthly by a formula which considers general economic conditions as shown in the index of wholesale commodity prices published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics; milk supply and demand factors, and seasonality.

QUESTION: A young friend of my son's drove up into the hills on a fishing trip a couple of weeks ago. He left a valuable rifle and some expensive fishing gear in his parked car while he fished along the banks of a stream. When he returned, he found the car had been broken into and the rifle, fishing gear and some other items stolen. He was not insured so he had to stand the loss. However, I have a theft policy and I'd like to know if it would protect me in a similar situation.

ANSWER: Your insurance man can interpret your particular policy but as a general rule, most Resident Theft policies written during the past several years would protect you fully under the circumstances described, if the "theft away from the premises" clause is included.
