Pvt. Waldruff Shot In Korean Accident

Buckton — According to a letter dated Jan. 23 received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Waldruff, Pvt. Charles Waldruff, in action in Korea, was accidentally wounded the week before in the jaw when a .45-caliber sub-machine carried by a friend discharged.

The bullet entered Private Waldruff's lower left lip, removed five teeth and came out the back of his neck. The soldier with the weapon was climbing on a truck when the accident happened.

Private Waldruff was given first aid at the scene, then flown to southern Japan where he underwent surgery, the first in a series of operations. He wrote that he expected to re-enter surgery the next day.

He entered the army with a Detroit reserve unit on Oct. 6, 1949 and was sent to Fort Lewis, Wash., where he trained until Nov. 29. He went to Japan and then to Korea in early December as an Eighth Army replacement. Transferred four times, Private Waldruff was finally attached to a motor pool.

Midnight Blaze Destroys Parishville Farm Home

Parishville — Starting in a clothes closet on the first floor, fire destroyed the home of Loren Barton Jr. on the Allens Falls road at midnight Friday. The cause of the blaze is unknown. The Parishville Fire Department was called, but the flames had too great a headstart.

Mr. and Mrs. Barton and some friends were in the dining room of the house when they noticed the fire. They rescued their children sleeping on the second floor, and brought them to the home of Loren Barton Sr., across the road.

Wind blew the flames away from the barn, which was left undamaged. The house was only partially covered by insurance. No insurance was on the furniture, most of which was consumed in the blaze or damaged by smoke and water.

The house is known locally as the Grace Doud tenant house.
