Mrs. Havington Dies In Potsdam Hospital

Funeral services for Mrs. Nettie Havington, 82, wife of William Havington of West Potsdam and a life-long resident of Potsdam, were held Monday, Feb. 19, at the Sullivan Funeral Chapel. The Rev. Charles B. Hanna, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, officiated. Burial was in Bayside Cemetery.

Mrs. Havington died at 7 a. m. on Friday, Feb. 9, in Potsdam Hospital, where she had been admitted three days before.

The daughter of Edwin and Fidelia Simmons, Mrs. Havington was born in Potsdam on June 18, 1868. Mr. and Mrs. Havington had lived at their farm home in West Potsdam since their marriage years ago.

She is survived by her husband and nieces and nephews.

were too young for service. Mr. Blake further said that a year in the Army at 18 could ruin a boy, while a man of 20 was better prepared for military service; with this, his friend agreed.

A young Potsdam mother, Mrs. Jean Lewis, was another of those who thought that veterans who had seen little or no active duty should be drafted before 18-year-olds.

"I don't know much about it," she said, "but I understand there are a lot of veterans who never saw much service who could be used in combat after they just had a refresher course, whereas the 18-year-olds would have to go all through basic training."

Guarantee Training
Guaranteeing a year's training to any 18-year-old who is drafted was suggested by Mrs. Myrtle Payson, 9 Willow St., as one solution to the problem. She felt strongly that boys of 18 were too young to be shipped overseas right away.

Don Blackmon, a life-long resident of Potsdam who works in the filter plant here, said that young men might as well be drafted at 18, since they would have to serve sooner or later. "We're going to have Universal Military Training before you know it," he said.

Draft Youths
Mr. Blackmon, who has a married son with the army of occupation in Japan, thought it would be better to draft the young ones before taking married men, whether or not they have children.

The prospect of a draft of 18-year-olds doesn't worry Richard Grant, 16, a sophomore at Potsdam High School. "I think I'd enlist in the Navy before I was drafted anyway," he said.

Mrs. Della Burlingame of Norwood said, "18-year-olds are not responsible enough for such a job." She added that most of the casualties you read about are among the younger men. Mrs. Ernest Cheney, who lives on the Winthrop road, felt much the same way.

Mrs. Cheney, whose 19-year-old grandson has just enlisted in the service, pointed out that most boys are still in school at 18. "When you have children of your own, you think more about it," she said, and added that she thought most parents wouldn't feel quite so bad about having their sons drafted at 19 as at 18.

Too Young
Miss Laura Page, a stenographer with the Racquette River Paper Company, also thought that 18-year-olds were too young to be drafted. Married men without children should be called first, she thought, but 18 year olds should be taken before men with children.

"If I were to speak from an emotional attitude I would say, don't draft them," said Verner M. Ingram, attorney and president of the Potsdam Chamber of Commerce. "However, we have a lot of emotional attitudes, but no facts."

Mr. Ingram said that it was up to the qualified military leaders to make the decision as to whether a draft of 18-year-olds is necessary. We can only hope they make the right decision he said, but without knowing all the facts, we are not qualified to decide the question ourselves.

Many of the people interviewed seemed to feel the same way as Mr. Ingram, although they expressed themselves differently. "I don't think I'm qualified to judge," was one typical reaction. Even those people who felt most strongly on the subject of drafting 18-year-olds agreed that the decision was a difficult one to make.

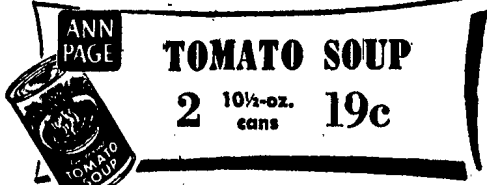

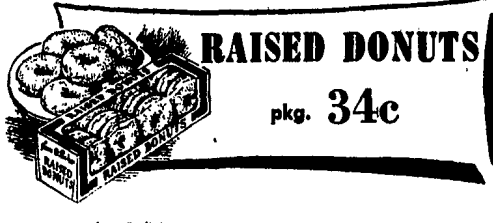
