## Sheriff Collects \$263 in Fines

Sheriff Henry Denner reported last week that \$263 in fines were collected by the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's office during January. Suspended fines amounted to \$25. Lost or stolen property reported to the sheriff was valued at \$400.

Arrests during January totaled 33. Vehicle and traffic infractions accounted for 20 of this number. There were six arrests for misdemeanors and one for a traffic misdemeanor; five were for penal law offenses, and one for the children's court.

Two larcenies were reported and investigated during the month. There were two stolen cars reported and 11 miscellaneous complaints. Four accidents were reported.

Civil fees collected during the month amounted to \$812.90. Papers served numbered 127 and executions, 85.

The number of persons admitted to jail was 39, four of whom were under 21 years old. Two persons were taken to Clinton Prison, one to Elmira Reception Center, and three to the state hospital at Ogdensburg.

The sheriff's car travelled 1301 miles during January. Deputies' cars travelled 11,420 miles, making a total mileage of 12,721. Deputy Sheriff Lawrence and Moon reported that the night patrol had received fines amounting to \$128 during January. Suspended fines during the same period totaled \$20.

The night patrol policed 2826 miles of state, county and town highways during the month, and checked 167 automobiles for equipment and licenses.

Arrests numbered 16, including eight for vehicle and traffic violations. Five people were arrested for offenses and ordinance violations, and two for misdemeanors. One children's court warrant was served.

The night patrol investigated 12 complaints and closed 10 of them. Six dances, four sporting events and two fires were policed. Papers served in January numbered 15.
