Brush Fire Burns 5 Hours; Damages Stockholm Woodlots

After five hours Wednesday afternoon, firemen finally extinguished a brush fire near North Stockholm which had burned a mile into woodlots and had endangered a home.

The blaze, firemen believe, was started by section men of the Rutland Railroad. Fanned by strong winds it jumped the railroad tracks near the home of Howard Taylor. Woodlots owned by Ossie Baxter and Floyd Osgood were damaged by the flames.

Norwood Fire Department answered the call. The Norwood department was aided by forest rangers and Conservation Department men from North Lawrence. Men from Norwood and Winthrop as well as railroad employees helped fight the fire. At one point it was feared that soldiers from Camp Drum would have to be called in to help.

Observers described flames shooting 100 feet in the air. The blaze moved through grass faster than a man could walk, they said. The fire was still burning in swamp land on Thursday, watched by forest rangers and conservation men. The main part of the fire was put out after five hours of fighting.
