Sheriff Reports On April Arrests

Canton — A total of 66 arrests were made in April by the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Department according to the monthly report of Sheriff Henry Denner.

Of these, 6 were for misdemeanors, 1 for a felony, 5 for miscellaneous offenses, 3 on village ordinance violations, 5 for highway overloads, 17 on vehicle and traffic misdemeanors, 28 for vehicle and traffic infractions, and one AWOL soldier.

Property reported lost or stolen during the month totaled \$637 and property recovered, \$187. Fines paid for the month came to \$479 and fines suspended, \$145. Eighty-six executions were made, and 230 civil papers were served for a total in civil fees for April of \$681.63.

Thirty persons were admitted to the jail during the month, two of them under 21, and 170 sets of fingerprints were taken and filed.

Also during the month the department investigated three burglaries, four larcenies, 22 miscellaneous complaints, and 11 accidents, one of which resulted in a fatality. One person was reported missing and was found.

The sheriff's car traveled a total of 1,680 miles on both civil and criminal matters and the deputies' cars, 20,654 miles.

The night patrol reported 4,563 miles of state, town and county highways patrolled, 142 vehicles checked, and 27 arrests. Fines paid amounted to \$126 and fines suspended \$65.

Twenty-five complaints were received and investigated, three accidents were policed and investigated, and \$150 in stolen property recovered. Also, five social events and two fires were policed, and 25 papers served.

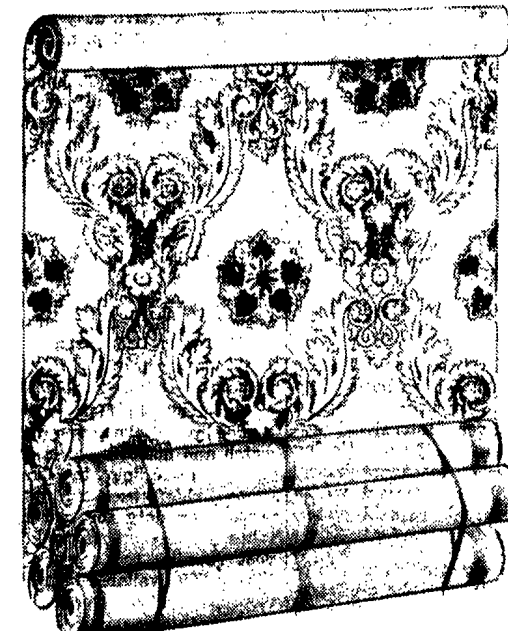
Miss Bostick Becomes Wai, Leaves for Texas
