

Tech Takes Camp Drum, 2-1; Errors Spell Difference

Hank Hodge's nine Tech charges scored two unearned runs in the fourth frame Saturday and defeated a Camp Drum ball team, 2-1, in a tight match on Snell Field.

Bill Byszewski allowed five hits before handing the round duties to Bill Chamberlain in the eighth inning. Chamberlain gave up one hit.

Clarkson got four hits off Holcombe, Camp Drum hurler.

Clarkson picked up their two runs in the fourth when Bucky Rohl doubled over third base to lead off. He advanced to third when Sellers grounded out. With two out Sam Zolner, first baseman, walked and took second on a rundown. Pohl and Zolner scored on an error by first baseman Young who dropped the throw on Larry Rupprecht's grounder.

Coach Hank Hodge pulled a switch on right handed slugger Tellingier by putting center fielder Stan Moore in deep left field, left fielder Bucky Rohl in left center and right fielder Dom Palozzi in short right, with third baseman George Franko and shortstop Frank Sestak deep and to the left of their regular positions and second baseman Larry Rupprecht to the left of second base. Tellingier obliged by flying to Moore in left in the fifth and Rohl in left center in the eighth.

Franko reached third in the fifth but was left stranded as Palozzi and Rohl fled to right.

Camp Drum scored their lone tally in the sixth as Young reached second on a throwing error by Frank Sestak and scored on a single by Russell. Tellingier singled to right advancing Russell to third but Jordan ended the inning by flying to centerfield.

Byszewski singled to right for Clarkson to open the seventh. He was sacrificed to second by Moore and advanced to third as Franko grounded out. He was left stranded as Palozzi grounded to second. First baseman Young hit a smash to left to open the eighth and rounded the bases but was called out as he failed to touch first.

Camp Drum's last threat ended when with two down in the ninth Pontarozzi singled but was caught in a run down between first and second to end the game.

Eleven errors, all of them at the wrong times, gave Tupper Lake a 10-8 victory over Potsdam High School Friday afternoon on the Leroy St. field. But when it came to the error column, Tupper Lake was almost as butter-fingered. The visiting Lumberjacks committed seven misplays.

When the smoke cleared after the fourth inning, it looked like Potsdam was in control of the game. The score was 7 to 1 for the Sandstoners. Leon Perry was on the mound and the situation was well in hand. But the fifth inning gave Tupper six runs to tie it up.

Potsdam came back with one run in their half of the fifth, but Tupper scored three times in an error-ridden sixth frame, to get the victory.

Alden Dunne, the winning pitcher pitched the full seven-inning contest, allowing Coach Ray Harrington's men seven hits. Tom Perry pitched six and two-thirds innings, allowing seven hits before he was relieved by Don Donah who allowed one. Perry was credited with the loss.

Donah, then in right field, and Perry scored in the second on a right-field single by Paul Murphy for the first two Potsdam runs.

Tupper pushed one across in the fourth when first-sacker Sharon singled and came in when catcher Murphy let a pitch get by him.

In the latter half of the fourth, five Sandstone runs came in while the Tupperers inaccurately threw the ball all over the diamond. Tom Covell walked. Hubie Roger's sacrifice bunt advanced him to second. Murphy walked and Al Reasoner singled to put Covell on third and Murphy on second. Covell scored on Obie Bancroft's sacrifice. Reasoner hit to the infield but was safe when Sharon dropped the throw to first, allowing Murphy to score.

Then Reasoner and Sherburne scored as Sharon dropped a throw to first after Bill Fiaco hit to the infield and followed with a wild throw into the outfield. Fiaco, who ended up on third when the overthrow parade finished, came in for the final run when Perry singled.
