### ROTC Students Receive Awards

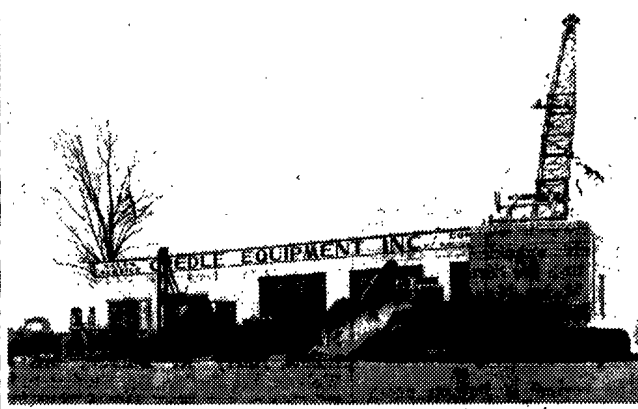

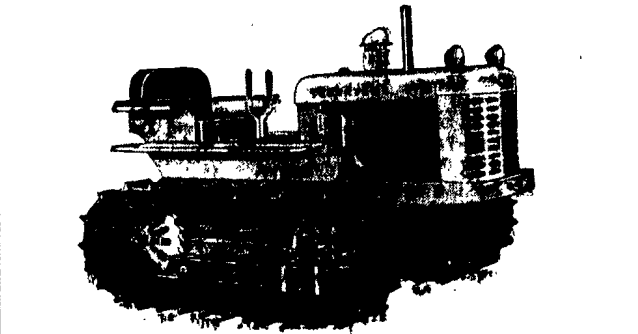


A/3c and Mrs. Kermit Ford pose following their May 10 wedding. She's the former Miss Arletha LaBaff of Potsdam.

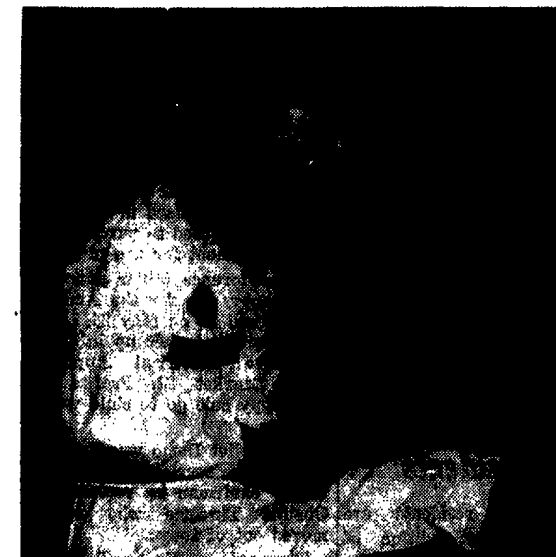
