Rochester Tips Clarkson, 7-6, In 10 Innings

Rochester — The University of Rochester pushed a run over on a single in the 10th inning Wednesday, May 14, to break a tie and topple Clarkson, 7-6, in the 10th inning.

Rochester's Mel Black allowed nine hits in winning the match. Stan Mroczkowski gave up eight hits in four and one-third innings before he was relieved by Bill Chamberlain who allowed six hits. Clarkson had previously beaten Rochester 7-4.

Clarkson scored in the ninth to even things at 6-6. Atkinson opened the Rochester half of the 10th with a single. Then George Parcells walked and Bobby Hayes drew a base on balls. They advanced on Parcell's neat sacrifice, and then Bob Dewar walked to fill the bases. Clarkson pulled fielders in tight and Stathe hit a 2-2 offering over rightfielder Bucky Rohl's head to score Atkinson.

Clarkson, after trailing 2-0, exploded for five markers in the fifth on two singles, two doubles, a walk and an error. The Yellowjackets got two of them back in the same inning when Tommy Sarro singled. Dewar was safe on a fielder's choice and Stathe walked to fill them up. Dave Horsman, who went 3 for 5 for the afternoon, singled score Sarro and Dewar.

Rochester added single tallies in the sixth and eighth to pull ahead, but Clarkson tied it in the ninth with a run on a walk and two singles.

Sarro had a perfect afternoon with a double and three singles in four trips. He batted in one run and scored four more. Pitcher Stan Mroczkowski, who was chased in the fifth, did better at the plate. He had two singles in as many trips.
